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pleasures of horror is a stimulating and insightful exploration of horror fictions literary cinematic and televisual and the emotions they engender in their audiences the text is divided into three sections the first examines how horror is valued and devalued in different cultural fields the second investigates the cultural politics of the contemporary horror film while the final part considers horror fandom in relation to its embodied practices film festivals its reading formations commercial fan magazines and fanzines and the role of special effects pleasures of horror combines a wide

range of media and textual examples with highly detailed and closely focused exposition of theory it is a fascinating and engaging look at responses to a hugely popular genre and an invaluable resource for students of media cultural and film studies and fans of horror

horrifying children examines weird and eerie children s television and literature via critical analysis memoir and autoethnography there has been an explosion of interest in the impact of children s television and literature of the late twentieth century in particular the 1970s 80s and 90s are seen as decades that shaped a great deal of the contemporary cultural landscape television of this period dominated the world of childhood entertainment drawing freely upon literature and popular culture like the garbage pail kids and stranger things and much of it continues to resonate powerfully with the generation of cultural producers fiction writers screenwriters directors musicians and artists that grew up watching the weird the eerie and the horrific the essence of 21st century hauntology in these terms this book is not about children s television as it exists now but rather as it features as a facet of memory in the 21st century as such it is the legacy of these television programmes that is at the core of horrifying children the haunting of adults by what we have seen on the screen is crucial to the study this collection directly addresses that which scared us in the past insomuch as there is a correlation between individual and collective cultural memory with some chapters providing an opportunity for situating existing explorations and understandings of gothic and horror tv within a hauntological and experiential framework

in this volume stephen prince has collected essays reviewing the history of the horror film and the psychological reasons for its persistent appeal as well as discussions of the developmental responses of young adult viewers and children to the genre the book focuses on recent postmodern examples such as the blair witch project in a daring move the volume also examines holocaust films in relation to horror part one features essays on the silent and classical hollywood eras part two covers the postworld war ii era and discusses the historical aesthetic and psychological characteristics of contemporary horror films in contrast to horror during the classical hollywood period contemporary horror features more graphic and prolonged visualizations of disturbing and horrific imagery as well as other distinguishing characteristics princes introduction provides an overview of the genre contextualizing the readings that follow stephen prince is professor of communications at virginia tech he has written many film books including classical film violence designing and

regulating brutality in hollywood cinema 19301968 and has edited screening violence also in the depth of field series

noel carroll film scholar and philosopher offers the first serious look at the aesthetics of horror in this book he discusses the nature and narrative structures of the genre dealing with horror as a transmedia phenomenon a fan and serious student of the horror genre carroll brings to bear his comprehensive knowledge of obscure and forgotten works as well as of the horror masterpieces working from a philosophical perspective he tries to account for how people can find pleasure in having their wits scared out of them what after all are those paradoxes of the heart that make us want to be horrified

claims authorial intention art history and morality play a role in our encounter with art works

in reading the bible with horror brandon r grafius takes the reader on a whirlwind tour through the dark corners of the hebrew bible along the way he stops to place the monstrous leviathan in conversation with contemporary monster theory uses derrida to help explore the ghosts that haunt the biblical landscape and reads the house of david as a haunted house conversations arise between unexpected sources such as the pentateuch legal texts dealing with female sexuality and carrie throughout the book grafius asks how the hebrew bible can be both sacred text and tome of fright and he explores the numerous ways in which the worlds of religion and horror share uncomfortable spaces

fiction film has been and remains the privileged site of film studies with film history regularly being viewed as the rise of the narrative fiction film taking fiction film seriously argues that despite this privileged position the notion of fiction as it relates to cinema has yet to be properly interrogated mario slugan explores the significant misunderstandings concerning the categorisation of film audience experience and the real life effects of fiction he contends with the contradictory assumption that fiction films have tangible effects on audiences beliefs and behaviours while also intuitively being not true or not to be believed in slugan analyses the notion of fiction from a theoretical and historical perspective considering how it manifests in a broad range of films from the past 110 years including the arrival of a train lumi re brothers 1895 1897 the blair witch project myrick and s nchez 1999 and waltz with bashir folman 2008 he supports his close readings with findings from philosophy psychology and

literary studies and in doing so seeks to challenge the current state of film studies

what do horror films reveal about social difference in the everyday world criticism of the genre often relies on a dichotomy between monstrosity and normality in which unearthly creatures and deranged killers are metaphors for society s fear of the others that threaten the normal the monstrous other might represent women jews or blacks as well as indigenous queer poor elderly or disabled people the horror film s depiction of such minorities can be sympathetic to their exclusion or complicit in their oppression but ultimately these images are understood to stand in for the others that the majority dreads and marginalizes adam lowenstein offers a new account of horror and why it matters for understanding social otherness he argues that horror films reveal how the category of the other is not fixed instead the genre captures ongoing metamorphoses across normal self and monstrous other this transformative otherness confronts viewers with the other s experience and challenges us to recognize that we are all vulnerable to becoming or being seen as the other instead of settling into comforting certainties regarding monstrosity and normality horror exposes the ongoing struggle to acknowledge self and other as fundamentally intertwined horror film and otherness features new interpretations of landmark films

in the mid 1950s to combat declining theater attendance film distributors began releasing pre packaged genre double bills including many horror and science fiction double features though many of these films were low budget and low end others such as invasion of the body snatchers horror of dracula and the fly became bona fide classics beginning with universal international s 1955 pairing of revenge of the creature and cult of the cobra 147 officially sanctioned horror and sci fi double bills were released over a 20 year period this book presents these double features year by year and includes production details historical notes and critical commentary for each film

taking mary shelley s novel as its point of departure this collection of essays considers how her creation has not only survived but thrived over 200 years of media history in music film literature visual art and other cultural forms in studying

monstrous figures torn from the deepest and darkest imaginings of the human psyche the essays in this book deploy the latest analytical approaches drawn from such fields as musicology critical race studies feminist studies queer theory and psychoanalysis the book interweaves the manifold sounds sights and stories of monstrosity into a conversation that sheds light on important social issues aesthetic trends and cultural concerns that are as alive today as they were when shelley s landmark novel was published 200 years ago

nigel kneale s writing career spanned the second half of the twentieth century arguably contributing to the shape of british television drama as well as having lingering influence in science fiction and horror this collection focuses on kneale s horror writing particularly in film and television taking a number of different academic perspectives the chapters approach questions of medium adaptation genre and style emphasising the role that time plays in kneale s horror and how he connected to wider cultural concerns the work covered includes more famous productions such as the quatermass serials the woman in black and nineteen eighty four as well as some that have received less attention including the social horror of kneale s film adaptations of look back in anger and the entertainer lost productions such as the chopper and bam pow zap and unproduced work such as the big big giggle drawing on archival sources including kneale s own archives alongside the productions themselves the collection portrays kneale as a writer deeply concerned with society and social change with the potential and responsibility of the media and not as a horror writer but a writer deeply concerned with the horrific

a new edition of a major philosophical work this remarkable text first published in 1964 was a landmark of its era and remains in the words of michael löwy a work of remarkable richness drawing on georg luk cs history and class consciousness lucien goldmann applies the concept of world visions to flesh out the similarities between pascal s pens®es and kant s critical philosophy contrasting them with the rationalism of descartes and the empiricism of hume for goldmann a leading exponent of the most fruitful method of applying marxist ideas to literary and philosophical problems the tragic vision marked an important phase in the development of european thought as it moved from rationalism and empiricism to the dialectical philosophy of hegel marx and luk cs here he offers a general approach to the problems of philosophy of literary criticism and of the relationship between thought and action in human society

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
