in the sixteenth century italian was a literary language not accessible to the less educated among them women who would instead speak a local dialect little attention has been paid to women s linguistic education but this study shows the vital role they played in developing italian as a true mother tongue

language standardization is an ongoing process based on the notions of linguistic correctness and models this manual contains thirty six chapters that deal with the theories of linguistic norms and give a comprehensive up to date description and analysis of the standardization processes in the romance languages the first section presents the essential approaches to the concept of linguistic norm ranging from antiquity to the present and includes individual chapters on the notion of linguistic norms and correctness in classical grammar and rhetoric

in the prague school in the linguistic theory of eugenio coseriu in sociolinguistics as well as in pragmatics cognitive and discourse linguistics the second section focuses on the application of these notions with respect to the romance languages it examines in detail the normative grammar and the normative dictionary as the reference tools for language codification and modernization of those languages that have a long and well established written tradition i e romanian italian french catalan spanish and portuguese furthermore the volume offers a discussion of the key issues regarding the standardization of the minor romance languages as well as creoles

the past few years have witnessed a growing academic interest in italian studies and an increasing number of symposia and scholarly activities this volume originates from the society for italian studies postgraduate colloquia that took place at the university of leicester and cambridge in june 2004 and april 2005 respectively it gathers together articles by young researchers working on various aspects of italian studies it well illustrates current trends in both typical areas of research like literature and high culture and in those which have gained momentum in recent years like translation and language studies the volume offers a taste of the dynamic outlook of current research in italian studies the interdisciplinary approach of the essays in translation and gender studies and the innovative methodological perspectives and findings offered by the new fields of italian I2 and ethnography the book is divided into three sections each grouping contributions by broad subject areas literature and culture translation and gender studies language and linguistics cross fertilizations and interdisciplinary research emerge from several essays and the coherent ensemble constitutes an example of the far reaching results achieved by current research

any notion linguistically expressed even one such as the syllable is always the result of several different viewpoints in order to take this into account this book draws inspiration from the scheme of quaternion as conceived by sir william rowan hamilton and later introduced in theoretical linguistics by ferdinand de saussure the first term of the quaternion the dawn of the syllable is provided by historical observations the second term beyond the sound of syllables is composed of different descriptive analyses of the syllable carried out in some particular languages and dialects the third term the body of syllables presents the analytical instrumental analysis of the syllable while the fourth de syllaba ventura proposes some theoretical considerations

after reviewing from a grammaticalization perspective the main stages in the evolution of italian object clitic pronouns the book discusses the distinctive morphosyntactic semantic and pragmatic features of italian clitics in particular the book offers an original study of the most common examples of so called verbi procomplementari verbs which are characterized by the incorporation of clitics that no longer function as pronouns and which are widely used in present day italian their emergence involves both grammaticalization of the clitic pronoun into an obligatory element and lexicalization of the verb clitic sequence this study is essentially descriptive and maximally data driven the discussion of grammaticalization and lexicalization is reduced to the essentials and aims primarily at defining how these terms which have received different and at times divergent interpretations are employed in the book the book is accessible to a wide and varied readership which includes italian and romance linguists of functional and formal orientation italian language scholars grammaticalization scholars interested in new case studies as well as students of language change and variation

investigating the interrelationships between orality and writing in elite and popular textual culture in early modern italy this volume shows how the spoken or sung word on the one hand and manuscript or print on the other hand could have interdependent or complementary roles to play in the creation and circulation of texts the first part of the book centres on performances ranging from realizations of written texts to improvisations or semi improvisations that might draw on written sources and might later be committed to paper case studies examine the poems sung in the piazza that narrated contemporary warfare commedia dell arte scenarios and the performative representation of the diverse spoken languages of italy the second group of essays studies the influence of speech on the written word and reveals that as fourteenth century tuscan became accepted as a literary standard contemporary non standard spoken languages were seen to possess an immediacy that made them an effective resource within certain kinds of written communication the third part considers the roles of orality in the worlds of the learned and of learning the book as a whole demonstrates that the borderline between orality and writing was highly permeable and that the culture of the period with its continued reliance on orality alongside writing was often hybrid in nature

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
