Can language and literature cure psychological trauma? If so, what forms do they have to take in doing so? jennifer ho ymitri mathison leah milne joy takako taylor and traise yamamoto often referred to as the model minority asian american children and adolescents feel pressured to perform academically and be disinterested in sports with the exception of martial arts boys are often stereotyped as physically unattractive nerds and girls as petite and beautiful many americans remain unaware of the diversity of ethnicities and races the term asian american comprises with asian american adolescents proving to be more invisible than adults as a result asian american adolescents are continually searching for their identity and own place in american society for these kids being or considered to be american becomes a challenge in itself as they assert their asian and american identities claim their own ethnic identity be they immigrant or american born and negotiate their ethnic communities the contributors to growing up asian american in young adult fiction focus on moving beyond stereotypes to examine how asian american children and adolescents define their unique identities chapters focus on primary texts from many ethnicities such as chinese korean filipino japanese vietnamese south asian and hawaiian individual chapters crossing cultural linguistic and racial boundaries negotiate the complex terrain of asian american children s and teenagers identities chapters cover such topics as internalized racism and self loathing hypersexualization of asian american females in graphic novels interracial friendships transnational adoptions and birth searches food as a means of assimilation and resistance commodity racism and the tourist gaze the hostile and alienating environment generated by the war on terror and many other topics

originally published in 1988 this book brings brain science to literary criticism the brain of robert frost combines psychoanalysis with the findings of brain research and cognitive psychology to model the way we create and respond to literature norman holland draws three central ideas from the mind s new science the critical supercharged period in infancy when individuality is formed the binding of emotion to intellect deep in the old brain the top down inside out feedback processing of language in the new then using robert frost as an example both of a writer and a reader and comparing frost s reading of a poem to readings by six professors of literature holland builds a new powerful way of thinking about literary criticism and teaching a book about literary cognition the brain of robert frost furthers our understanding of the reading process of poet s brains and of our own

this book uses the metaphors of practice spaces and practice sessions to demonstrate the

connection between creative and performance practices and critical pedagogy it offers a conceptual framework for using performance and creative practices as starting points for developing philosophies and practices of teaching that are grounded in aesthetic creative and critical approaches to education the practice sessions for pedagogy presented include a range of creative endeavours such as performance workshops musical routines crafting practices and writing by focusing on the critical function of creative practices the book emphasizes the ways creativity can reveal the relationship between everyday acts and social and cultural ideologies and structures creative practices also present the opportunity for imagining new more socially just and inclusive configurations of these relationships this book is designed for teachers and students interested in critical pedagogy performance and creative educational practices

writing the frontier anthony trollope between britain and ireland is the first book length study of the great victorian novelist s relationship with ireland the country which became his second home and was the location of his first personal and professional success it offers an in depth exploration of trollope s time in ireland as a rising post office official contextualising his considerable output of irish novels and short stories and his ongoing interest in the country its people and its always complicated relationship with britain trollope s irish novels were long neglected but are vital to any understanding of his entire oeuvre and when given their just place alter our overall view of the writer and his take on the world uniquely among his fellow english novelists trollope consciously occupied a mediating position believing he knew ireland better than any other englishman and better than most irishmen and used his novels to represent that ireland to an english public trollope s irish works constitute a vital and distinct group of works add significantly to our vision of the writer change the prevalent view that he is always safe and english and represent a rich and underestimated contribution to the canon of the nineteenth century irish novel tout court complicating the sometimes arbitrary divisions that are drawn between the english and the irish traditions
