translations of the old english poem beowulf proliferate and their number continues to grow focusing on the particularly rich period since 1950 this book presents a critical account of translations in english verse setting them in the contexts both of the larger story of recovery and reception of the poem and perceptions of it

this book is both a careful study of immanuel kant s work and the context of that work in the movement known as early modern philosophy the chief interest of the author concerns the philosophy of perception that is manifest in kant s doctrines of the transcendental aesthetic and the concept of phenomena philosophy bears a crucial relationship to the public in terms of the evidence that it identifies as original and binding in the early modern period philosophy repudiated its dependence on ordinary perception and on language as ordinarily used in the setting forth of its own authority this historiographical fact is presently of immense interest as public discourse finds itself rudderless and without agreed upon common facts for deliberation to settle on it was not the view of the ancient greeks that philosophy could so emancipate itself from the perception of common facts as the original evidence for higher investigations the early modern era beginning with bacon but now more furiously in the work of kant has anchored a general indictment of

ordinary perception in a remnant of natural philosophy human beings in kant s philosophy are not capable of knowing what objects external objects are in themselves we may only know what are called appearances and kant refers to these appearances as phenomena yet this claim is complicated by the a priori knowledge which kant claims to possess as regards these phenomena that they must all be eternal substances the book freely moves back and forth between greek antiquity and the early modern period to illustrate the full nature of the rupture on this ground of the metaphysics of fact determination for aristotle the founder of the theory of substance substances are just the perishable bodies commonly perceived kant s phenomena which claims to embody what appears to the generality of the human race cannot be that for the human race does not perceive eternal objects

translation and literature in east asia between visibility and invisibility explores the issues involved in translation between chinese japanese and korean as well as from these languages into european languages with an eye to comparing the cultures of translation within east asia and tracking some of their complex interrelationships this book reasserts the need for a paradigm shift in translation theory that looks beyond european languages and furthers existing work in this field by encompassing a wider range of literature and scholarship in east asia translation and literature in east asia brings together material dedicated to the theory and practice of translation between and from east asian languages for the first time

since george gaylord simpson published tempo and mode in evolution in 1944 discoveries in paleontology and genetics have abounded this volume brings together the findings and insights of today s leading experts in the study of evolution including ayala w ford doolittle and stephen jay gould the volume examines early cellular evolution explores changes in the tempo of evolution between the precambrian and phanerozoic periods and reconstructs the cambrian evolutionary burst long neglected despite darwin s interest in it species extinction is discussed in detail although the absence of data kept simpson from exploring human evolution in his book the current volume covers morphological and genetic changes in human populations contradicting the popular claim that all modern humans descend from a single woman this book discusses the role of molecular clocks the results of evolution in 12 populations of escherichia coli propagated for 10 000 generations a physical map of drosophila chromosomes and evidence for hitchhiking by mutations

clement greenberg 1909 1994 champion of abstract expressionism and modernism of pollock miró and matisse has been esteemed by many as the greatest art critic of the second half of the twentieth century and possibly the greatest art critic of all time on radio and in print greenberg was the voice of the new american painting and a central figure in the postwar cultural history of the united states greenberg first established his reputation writing for the partisan review which he joined as an editor in 1940 he became art critic for the nation in 1942 and was associate editor of commentary

from 1945 until 1957 his seminal essay avant garde and kitsch set the terms for the ongoing debate about the relationship of modern high art to popular culture though many of his ideas have been challenged greenberg has influenced generations of critics historians and artists and he remains influential to this day

post truth was oxford dictionaries 2016 word of the year while the term was coined by its disparagers in the light of the brexit and us presidential campaigns the roots of post truth lie deep in the history of western social and political theory post truth reaches back to plato ranging across theology and philosophy to focus on the machiavellian tradition in classical sociology as exemplified by vilfredo pareto who offered the original modern account of post truth in terms of the circulation of elites the defining feature of post truth is a strong distinction between appearance and reality which is never quite resolved and so the strongest appearance ends up passing for reality the only question is whether more is gained by rapid changes in appearance or by stabilizing one such appearance post truth plays out what this means for both politics and science

aimed at students and researchers in mathematics history of mathematics and science this book examines the development of mathematics from the late 16th century to the end of the 19th century mathematics has an amazingly long and rich history it has been practised in every society and culture with written records reaching back in some cases as far as four thousand years this book will focus on just a small part of the story in a sense the most recent chapter of it the mathematics of western europe from the sixteenth to the nineteenth centuries each chapter will focus on a particular topic and outline its history with the provision of facsimiles of primary source material along with explanatory notes and modern interpretations almost every source is given in its original form not just in the language in which it was first written but as far as practicable in the layout and typeface in which it was read by contemporaries this book is designed to provide mathematics undergraduates with some historical background to the material that is now taught universally to students in their final years at school and the first years at college or university the core subjects of calculus analysis and abstract algebra along with others such as mechanics probability and number theory all of these evolved into their present form in a relatively limited area of western europe from the mid sixteenth century onwards and it is there that we find the major writings that relate in a recognizable way to contemporary mathematics

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
