this book is an analysis of the social criticism and the political implications of rhetorical strategies in personal political nonfictional narratives by liberal american writers from the 18th century till the 1970s using the theories of mikhail bakhtin schueller examines works by benjamin franklin henry david thoreau henry james henry adams jane addams james agee norman mailer and maxine hong kingston

bodies that birth puts birthing bodies at the centre of questions about contemporary birth politics power and agency arguing that the fleshy and embodied aspects of birth have been largely silenced in social science scholarship rachelle chadwick uses an array of birth stories from diverse race class demographics to explore the narrative entanglements between flesh power and sociomateriality in relation to birth adopting a unique theoretical framework incorporating new materialism feminist theory and a foucauldian analytics of power the book aims to trace and trouble taken for granted assumptions about birthing bodies through a diffractive and dialogical approach the analysis highlights the interplay between corporeality power and ideologies in the making of birth narratives across a range of intersectional differences the book shows that there is no singular birthing body apart from sociomaterial relations of power instead birthing bodies are uncertain zones or unpredictable assortments of physiology flesh sociomateriality discourse and affective flows at the same time birthing bodies are located within intra acting fields of power relations including biomedicine racialized patriarchy socioeconomics and geopolitics bodies that birth brings the voices of women from different sociomaterial positions into conversation ultimately the book explores how attending to birthing bodies can vitalize global birth politics by listening to what matters to women in relation to birth this is fascinating reading for researchers academics and students from across the social sciences

adopting an interdisciplinary approach this book investigates the style or voice of english language translations of twentieth century latin american writing the style of the different translators is subjected to a close linguistic investigation within their cultural and ideological framework

this book examines the ideological affinity that can be established between the classical bildungsroman and colonialist ideology on the basis of a literary analysis of wilhelm meisters lehrjahre considered by most critics to be the origin of the genre and great expectations one of the paradigmatic examples of the development of the bildungsroman in english literature this ideological affinity is understood as an example of what the palestinian critic edward said has called a structure of attitude and reference the convergence of different cultural manifestations that although formally independent contribute to a common purpose the monograph also undertakes a study of the main characteristics of the classical bildungsroman from a formal and thematic point of view and an analysis of the relationship between genre theories and eurocentric discourses

this book filled with the voices of teenage girls corrects the misperceptions that have crept into our picture of female adolescence based on the author s yearlong conversation with white junior high and middle school girls from the working poor and the middle class raising their voices allows us to hear how girls adopt some expectations about gender but

the life of voices illustrates how human voices have special significance as the place where mind and body collaborate to produce everyday speech hannah rockwell links russian semiotician mikhail bakhtin s philosophy of dialogue with french phenomenologist maurice merleau ponty s views of the relation between bodies and speech expression to develop a unique theory of communication and bodies by introducing readers to actual human subjects speaking about how their identities have been shaped and transformed through time the author explores how discourses reproduce ideology and social power relations readers are challenged to consider complex influences between human subjects and institutionalized discourses through critical interpretive analyses of transcribed speech the life of voices has an interdisciplinary flair grounded in careful research scholars in communication sociology philosophy psychology linguistics anthropology gender studies and identity politics will find valuable insights methods and examples in this work it is essential reading for anyone who is interested in discourse studies and the body s relationship to speech or human identity formation

ezra pound s cantos remains among the most influential and difficult of twentieth century poetic writings but now for the first time rabat s powerful and original study presents a theory of reading adequate to the challenge of pound s writing using elements from lacanian psycho analysis and heidegger s powerful meditation of poetry and language this book constructs a theory of reading which both gives full force to the strategies of writing deployed in the cantos and to the historical and political situations to which those strategies are a response this study provides a fresh reading of the familiar pound canon homer dante ovid but also of the less well known ruskin browning frobenius pound s practice of quotation is understood in the context of a new poetic discourse characterized by parapraxis ellipsis condensation and autonomous voices which refer the division of the speaking subject back to an omniform intellect capable of taking on any new personality at will crucial to an understanding of pound s situation is the relationship between chinese and greek culture an analysis of which allows rabat to elaborate the tragic dimension pound s life and works this book also parallels and contrasts pound with his major contemporaries such as eliot and joyce and with his immediate heirs like william carlos williams h d zukofsky and olson

the italian giallo was a sleazy violent and stylistically baroque form of horror film that was produced in the hundreds from the 1960s to the 1980s sound and horror in the giallo film listens closely to these films asking how their soundtracks and their use of the human voice can help us understand the giallo s significance at a time when italy was undergoing profound postwar social economic political and cultural change throughout the history of italian cinema soundtracks have been a site of concerted and sustained intervention by political and economic forces in sound and horror in the giallo film author damien pollard argues that because the giallo film pushed the boundaries of film form while also touting unapologetic commercialism the voices on its soundtracks were both aesthetically exaggerated and directly shaped by commercial imperatives which were influenced by italy
