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this book is a pioneering effort in critical arctic studies the contributions identify and investigate some of the blind spots in human development in the arctic that research in the social sciences had yet to broach to this end the authors tap a variety of critical approaches in fields spanning aesthetics affect theory biopolitics critical geopolitics indigenous archaeology intersectionality legal anthropology moral economy narrative studies neoliberal governmentality queer studies and socio legal studies the

chapters probe topics such as representations of the arctic in contemporary art the role of affects in postcolonial greenland canada's arctic policies and china's engagement with the arctic the book provides a rich knowledge base for researchers in arctic social sciences and offers an absorbing textbook for students interested in arctic issues

james gunn one of the founding figures of science fiction scholarship and teaching wrote in 1951 what is likely the first master s thesis on modern science fiction portions were in the short lived pulp magazine dynamic but it has otherwise remained unavailable here in its first full publication the thesis explores many of the classic golden age stories of the 1940s and the critical perspective that informed gunn s essential genre history alternate worlds and his anthology series the road to science fiction the editor s introduction and commentary show the historical significance of gunn s work and its relevance to today s science fiction studies

abstract this study explores the perspectives of phd scholars in india regarding the national education policy nep 2020 using a qualitative approach semi structured interviews were conducted with 40 scholars from diverse academic disciplines to assess their awareness perceived opportunities challenges and expectations concerning nep 2020 the results indicate a significant gender disparity in awareness levels with 35 of male participants reporting high awareness compared to 25 of females while 40 of female scholars expressed a lack of awareness participants identified opportunities such as the promotion of research culture and interdisciplinary studies but also highlighted challenges including lack of implementation strategies and inadequate research infrastructure the study found

that nep 2020 is anticipated to positively impact research culture inter institutional collaborations and research output though concerns about inclusiveness and accessibility remain particularly regarding gender equality recommendations for effective implementation include strengthening policy monitoring enhancing faculty development programs and bridging the gap between policy and practice the insights from this study contribute to the existing literature and provide valuable guidance for policymakers to support the successful realization of nep 2020 s objectives ultimately enhancing the quality and relevance of higher education in india

too often attacked as hopelessly abstract contemporary critical social theory can help us to understand both public policy and its analysis in this book john forester shows how policy analysis planning and public administration are thoroughly political communicative practices that subtly and selectively organize public attention drawing from jürgen habermas s critical communications theory of society forester shows how policy developments alter the social infrastructure of society he provides a clear introduction to critical social theory at the same time that he clarifies the practical and political challenges facing public policy analysts public managers and planners working in many fields

this book expands upon a range of economic insights within the overall context of critical theory particularly with respect to the question of socioeconomic inequalities and presents an explanation of how critical theory provides a number of interesting perspectives for economists economic agents deliberately imprisoned in their instrumental rationality as a means to survive under competitive relationships are microscopic constituents of systemic forces which exist beyond their will despite the subjective rationality of such agents in terms of formally logical transitivity and consistency aggregate market distributional mechanisms also display non rational patterns the crucial aspect of the dynamics of this system consists of the paralysing effect of the high level of socioeconomic inequality which is driven by a permanent struggle for self preservation under competitive rules it is a reminiscence of natural uncivilised relationships that constituted the reproduction process of the whole these reified agents thus become instruments of their socially constructed powers on the one hand and objects of their existential conditionality on the other hence the dialectical approach adopted by the author aims to uncover the way in which structurally genetic market forces govern individual behaviour as well as how individual behaviour shapes these structurally genetic forces which together form the transcending principles of unequal distribution this book will be of particular interest to scholars of the political economy philosophy and the methodology of the social sciences especially those concerned with inequality issues this book includes a preface written by professor martin jay

the politics of the twenty first century is marked by dissent tumult and calls for radical change whether through food riots anti war protests anti government tirades anti blasphemy marches anti austerity demonstrations anti authoritarian movements and anti capitalist occupations interestingly contemporary political protests are borne of both the right and left and are staged in both the global north and south globally different instances of protest have drawn attention to the deep fissures which challenge the idea of globalisation as a force for peace given the diversity of these protests it is necessary to examine the particular nature of grievances the sort of change which is sought and the

this critical theory and contemporary society volume analyzes how cinema can help critical theory repoliticize culture and society

in this book robert j lowe introduces frame analysis a qualitative research approach grounded in the critical theory of the early frankfurt school and framing in the social sciences lowe sets out the principles of the frame analysis approach and provides a guide to conducting this kind of research in practice focused on identifying and challenging ideology through immanent critique lowe presents a methodological guide and research report he begins by explaining early critical theory and the frame analysis approach followed by a detailed example of its application this example illustrates the key stages identifying participants ideological presuppositions through their master framing questioning

the internal logic of this framing and presenting contradictions to participants finally the researcher observes reactions and documents emerging counter framing marking the first signs of resistance to dominant ideology by applying this approach to issues in english language teaching the book questions some of the ways in which the rhetoric of pluralism and diversity around english as an international language may stand at odds with the realities of a world in which some varieties of the language have more prestige than others through the frame analysis approach the author suggests that researchers can play a role in empowering language learners and users to advocate for a world in which they can take true ownership of the language key reading for all qualitative researchers and advanced students in applied linguistics sociolinguistics elt tesol and linguistic anthropology

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
