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a searing journey through the highs and lows of twenty first century womanhood from an award winning journalist beloved for her unflinchingly honest and often comedic appraisals of pop culture identity and disillusionment a delicious reading experience like hearing your smartest friend eviscerate the worst person you know sabrina imbler author of how far the light reaches such a brilliant writer with so many surprising moves torrey peters author of detransition baby after a brief fling with corporate stability in her twenty something cis era harron walker has transitioned into a terminally single freelancer and part time shopgirl she s in the throes

of her second adolescence and its requisite daily spirals she wants it all otherwise known as basic human rights a stable job with good pay and healthcare benefits someone to love the ability to feel safe and secure the pursuit of satisfaction and maybe even contentment and when she starts to acquire those things well as the monkey s paw famously asked what could go wrong in sixteen wholly original essays that blend memoir cultural criticism investigative journalism and a dash of fanfiction walker places her own experiences within the larger context of the pressing and underdiscussed aspects of contemporary american womanhood that make up daily life she recounts an attempt to eviscerate a corporation s attempt at pinkwashing their way into bath bomb sales while simultaneously confronting her pick me impulse to do so she interrogates her relationship to labor from the irony of working in a transphobic workplace in order to cover gender affirming surgery to the cruel specter of the girlboss that none of us ever think we ll become she explores the allure and violence of assimilating into white womanhood in all its hegemonic glory exposes the ways in which the truth of trans women s reproductive healthcare is erased in favor of reactionary narratives and considers how our agency is stripped from us by governments employers partners and ourselves purely on account of our bodies with razor sharp biting prose that s as uncompromising as it is playful walker grapples with questions of love sex fertility labor embodiment community autonomy and body fluids from her particular vantagepoint often at the margins conditionally at the center

from the gibson girl to the flapper from the vamp to the new woman carolyn kitch traces mass media images of women to their historical roots on magazine covers unveiling the origins of gender stereotypes in early twentieth century american culture kitch examines the years from 1895 to 1930 as a time when the first wave of feminism intersected with the rise of new technologies and media for the reproduction and dissemination of visual images access to suffrage higher education the professions and contraception broadened women s opportunities but the images found on magazine covers emphasized the role of women as consumers suffrage was reduced to spending sexuality to sexiness and a collective women s movement to individual choices of personal style in the 1920s kitch argues the political prominence of the new woman dissipated but her visual image pervaded print media with seventy five photographs of cover art by the era s most popular illustrators the girl on the magazine cover shows how these images created a visual vocabulary for understanding femininity and masculinity as well as class status through this iconic process magazines helped set cultural norms for women for men and for what it meant to be an american kitch contends

this book integrates new material using sources from the eighteenth and nineteenth century periodical press research with

contemporary readers the authors critical reading of past and present magazines and a clear discussion of theoretical approaches from literary criticism the development of the genre and its part in the historical process of forging modern definitions of gender class and race are analysed through critical readings and a discussion of readers negotiations with the contradictory pleasures of the magazine and its constricting ideal of femininity

through engaging media coverage of the public lives of bollywood actresses this book unveils understandings of idealized femininity and gender within this cultural context beyond its own borders such a context is unique given the global relevance of content from and about bollywood with members of the diaspora as well as those culturally indian individuals that are no longer part of the diaspora this book thus engages these actresses as global indian celebrities who are framed and presented as contemporary urban indian exemplars of gender via media coverage about them the book therefore offers a robust and detailed case study of the bollywood star system so as to demonstrate how the nuances of this unique cultural context influence the dimensions of postfeminism and celebrity culture therein

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this book examines the reception of graeco roman sculptures of venus and their role in the construction of the body aesthetics of the fit american woman in the decades around the turn of the 20th century in this historical moment 19th century anthropometric methods the anti corset dress reform movement and early fitness culture were united in their goal of identifying and producing healthy procreative female bodies these discourses presented ancient statues of venus most frequently the venus de milo as the supreme visual model of a superior fit feminine physique an america of such venuses would herald the future prosperity of the american race by reviving the robust health and moral righteousness of the ancient greeks venuses had long been symbols of beauty but the new situation of venus statues as an aesthetic and moral destination for women set up a slippage between ideal sculpture and

living bodies what did it mean for a woman to embody or to try to embody the perfect health and beauty of an ancient statue how were women expected to translate this model into flesh what were the political stakes to which this vision of a nation of american venuses was bound who was believed to conform to this ideal and who was excluded from it in taking on these questions franks engages with physical culture and dress reform media modern artwork that adapts graeco roman traditions anthropological texts art histories of ancient greece film advertising and medical reporting on women s health

interweaving nuanced discussions of politics visuality and gender gender and activism in a little magazine uncovers the complex ways that gender figures into the graphic satire created by artists for the new york city based socialist journal the masses this exceptional magazine was published between 1911 and 1917 during an unusually radical decade in american history and featured cartoons drawn by artists of the ashcan school and others addressing questions of politics gender labor and class rather than viewing art from the masses primarily in terms of its critical social stances or aesthetic choices however this study uses these images to open up new ways of understanding the complexity of early 20th century viewpoints by focusing on the activist images found in the masses and studying their unique perspective on american modernity rachel schreiber also returns these often ignored images to their rightful place in the scholarship on american modernism this book demonstrates that the centrality of the masses artists commitments to gender and class equality is itself a characterization of the importance of these issues for american moderns despite their alarmingly regular reliance on gender stereotypes and regardless of any assessment of the efficacy of the artists activism the graphic satire of the masses offers invaluable insights into the workings of gender and the role of images in activist practices at the beginning of the last century

what happens when we become one person in the outer world while our true feminine self is buried below the surface like so many other women with this dilemma annika thomas who is a designer of clothes became over identified with her persona as she became conscious of this inner split embarking on a quest for wholeness seemed like her only option this book is the story of her dramatic journey to find and embody her true self feminine threads is an in depth exploration of the feminine and its connection to clothes and beauty the personal threads of a contemporary woman s life as well as some of her experiences beyond time and space are interwoven with impersonal threads of cultural mythic historic and psycho spiritual perspectives the richly adorned tapestry that emerges presents a deeper holistic image of womanhood that helps us grasp the mystery of true feminine beauty

modern woman was made between the french revolution and the end of the first world war in this time the women of europe crafted new ideas about their sexuaity motherhood the home the politics of femininity and their working roles they faced challenges about what a woman should be and how she should act from domestic ideology to women s suffrage this book charts the contests for woman s identity in the epoch shaping nineteenth century

explores business development in the black power era and the centrality of economic goals to the larger black freedom movement the business of black power emphasizes the centrality of economic goals to the larger black freedom movement and explores the myriad forms of business development in the black power era this volume charts a new course forblack power studies and business history exploring both the business ventures that black power fostered and the impact of black power on the nation s business world black activists pressed business leaders corporations and various levels of government into supporting a range of economic development ventures from black entrepreneurship to grassroots experiments in economic self determination to indigenous attempts to rebuild inner city markets in thewake of disinvestment they pioneered new economic and development strategies often in concert with corporate executives and public officials yet these same actors also engaged in fierce debates over the role of business in strengthening the movement and some african americans outright rejected capitalism or collaboration with business the ten scholars in this collection bring fresh analysis to this complex intersection of african american and business history to reveal how black power advocates or those purporting a black power agenda engaged business to advance their economic political and social goals they show the business of black power taking place in thestreets boardrooms journals and periodicals corporations courts and housing projects of america in short few were left untouched by the influence of this movement laura warren hill is assistant professor of history at bloomfield college julia rabig is a lecturer at dartmouth college

in 1920 w e b du bois cited the damnation of women as linked to the devaluation of motherhood this dilemma he argues had a crushing blow on black women as they were forced into slavery black womanhood portrayed as hypersexual by nature became an enduring stereotype which did not coincide with the dignity of mother and wife this portrayal continues to reinforce negative stereotypes of black women in the media today this book highlights how black women have been negatively portrayed in the media focusing on the export nature of media and its ability to convey notions of blackness to the public it argues that media such as rap music videos television dramas reality television shows and newscasts create and affect expectations of black women exploring the

role that racism misogyny and media play in the representation of black womanhood it provides a foundation for challenging contemporary media s portrayal of black women

why do so many people try dieting only to fail what distinguishes those who succeed from those who do not are fat people really any different from thin people what makes us eat and how do we stop eating and how can dieting trigger problems with eating normally originally published in 1989 sara gilbert discusses these questions in tomorrow i ll be slim and draws on what is known about the psychology of eating overeating and weight control to dispel a number of popular myths about dieting she shows how unsuccessful dieting can lead to new problems with eating and weight control she points out that long term success in slimming has more to do with individual factors such as a dieter s expectations self confidence or social and family circumstances than with will power and as much to do with how a diet is managed as with the content of a diet sheet she suggests ways in which people who want to be slimmer can make a realistic assessment of their need to diet she explains how individuals who seriously need to lose weight or change the way they eat might draw up effective strategies for themselves and prepare for the inevitable difficulties we all face whenever we try to change old habits finally she addresses the problems of taking the emphasis off dieting and examining our attitudes to a slim figure as the key to happiness itself

this study focuses on a set of issues at the forefront of feminist thought in the late 1990s identity difference and their implications for feminist politics as feminism moves into an era in which differences among women the multiple identities of woman and identity politics are all at the centre of feminist discussions new approaches methods and politics are called for

as a counterpart to research on the 1930s that has focused on liberal and radical writers calling for social revolution david welky offers this eloquent study of how mainstream print culture shaped and disseminated a message affirming conservative middle class values and assuring its readers that holding to these values would get them through hard times through analysis of the era s most popular newspaper stories magazines and books welky examines how voices both outside and within the media debated the purposes of literature and the meaning of cultural literacy in a mass democracy he presents lively discussions of such topics as the newspaper treatment of the lindbergh kidnapping issues of race in coverage of the 1936 olympic games domestic dynamics and gender politics in cartoons and magazines superman s evolution from a radical outsider to a spokesman for the people and the popular consumption of

such novels as the ellery queen mysteries gone with the wind and the good earth through these close readings welky uncovers the subtle relationship between the messages that mainstream media strategically crafted and those that their target audience wished to hear

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
