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sand and pebbles presents the first complete english rendering of shasekish the classic popular buddhist tale

literature setsuwa this collection of instructive yet often humorous anecdotes appeared in the late thirteenth century within decades of the first stirrings of the revolutionary movements of kamakura buddhism shasekish—s author muj—ichien 1226 1312 lived in a rural temple apart from the centers of political and literary activity and his stories reflect the customs attitudes and lifestyles of the commoners in sand and pebbles complete translations of book one and other significant narrative parts are supplemented by summaries of the remaining especially didactic material and by excerpts from muj—s later work introduced by a historical sketch of the period this work also contains a biography of muj—illustrations charts a chronology glossary of terms notes an extensive bibliography and an index guide the reader into a seldom seen corner of old japan muj—and his writings will interest students of literature as well as scholars of japanese religion especially buddhism anthropologists and sociologists will discover details of kamakura life and thought unrecorded in the official chronicles of the age

what religion does not serve as a theater of tears holy tears addresses this all but universal phenomenon with passion and precision ranging from mycenaean greece up through the tragedy of 9 11 sixteen authors including many leading voices in the study of religion offer essays on specific topics in religious weeping while also considering broader issues such as gender memory physiology and spontaneity a comprehensive elegantly written introduction offers a key to these topics given the pervasiveness of its theme it is remarkable that this book is the first of its kind and it is long overdue the essays ask such questions as is religious weeping primal or culturally constructed is it universal is it spontaneous does god ever cry is religious weeping altered by sexual or social roles is it perhaps at once scripted and spontaneous private and communal is it indeed divine the grief occasioned by 9 11 and violence in afghanistan iraq israel and elsewhere offers a poignant context for this fascinating and richly detailed book holy tears concludes with a compelling meditation on the theology of weeping that emerged from pastoral responses to 9 11 as described in the editors interview with reverend betsee parker who became head chaplain for the office of the chief medical examiner of new york city and leader of the multifaith chaplaincy team at ground zero the contributors are diane apostolos cappadona amy bard herbert basser santha bhattacharji william chittick gary ebersole m david eckel john hawley gay lynch jacob olúpqnà with solá ajíbádé betsee parker kimberley patton nehemia polen kay read and kallistos ware

this volume offers a multidisciplinary approach to the combinatory tradition that dominated premodern and early modern japanese religion known as honji suijaku originals and their traces it questions received simplified accounts of the interactions between shinto and japanese buddhism and presents a more dynamic and variegated religious world one in which the deities buddhist originals and local traces did not constitute one to one associations but complex combinations of multiple deities based on semiotic operations doctrines myths and legends the book s essays all based on specific case studies discuss the honji suijaku paradigm from a number of different perspectives always integrating historical and doctrinal analysis with interpretive insights

silver medalist 2020 independent publisher book awards in the religion eastern western category this groundbreaking book explores buddhist thought and culture from multiple buddhist perspectives as sources for feminist reflection and social action too often when writers apply terms such as woman femininity and feminism to buddhist texts and contexts they begin with models of feminist thinking that foreground questions and concerns arising from western experience this oversight has led to many facile assumptions denials and oversimplifications that ignore women s diverse social and historical contexts but now with the tools of feminist analysis that have developed in recent decades constructs of the feminine in buddhist texts imagery and philosophy can be examined with the acknowledgment that there are limitations to applying these theoretical paradigms to other cultures contributors to this volume offer a feminist analysis which integrates gender theory and buddhist perspectives to buddhist texts and women s narratives from asia how do buddhist concepts of self and no self intersect with concepts of gender identity especially for women how are the female body sexuality and femininity constructed and contested in diverse buddhist contexts how might power and gender identity be perceived differently through a buddhist lens by exploring feminist approaches and representations of the feminine including persistent questions about women s identities as householders and renunciants this book helps us to understand how buddhist influences on attitudes toward women and how feminist thinking from other parts of the world can inform and enlarge contemporary discussions of feminism

although east asian religion is commonly characterized as syncretic the historical interaction of buddhist confucian and other traditions is often neglected by scholars of mainstream religious thought in this thought provoking study janine sawada moves beyond conventional approaches to the history of japanese religion by analyzing the ways in which neo confucianism and zen formed a popular synthesis in early modern japan she shows how shingaku a teaching founded by merchant ishida baigan blossomed after his death into a widespread religious movement that selectively combined ideas and practices from these traditions drawing on new research into original shingaku sources sawada challenges the view that the teaching was a facile merchant ethic by illuminating the importance of shingaku mystical experience and its intimate relation to moral cultivation in the program developed by baigan s successor teshima toan this book also suggests the need for an approach to the history of japanese education that accounts for the informal transmission of ideas as well as institutional schooling shingaku contributed to the development of japanese education by effectively disseminating moral and religious knowledge on a large scale to the less educated sectors of tokugawa society sawada interprets the popularity of the movement as part of a general trend in early modern japan in which ordinary people sought forms of learning that could be pursued in the context of daily life

zen sanctuary of purple robes examines the affairs of rinzai zen s t keiji convent founded in 1285 by nun kakusan shid after the death of her husband h j tokimune it traces the convent s history through seven centuries including the early nuns zen practice abbess y d s imperial lineage with nuns in purple robes hideyori s seven year old daughter later to become the convent s twentieth abbess tenshu spared by tokugawa ieyasu at the battle for

osaka castle t keiji as divorce temple during the mid edo period and a favorite topic of senryu satirical verse the convent s gradual decline as a functioning nunnery but its continued survival during the early meiji persecution of buddhism and its current prosperity the work includes translations charts illustrations bibliographies and indices beyond such historical details the authors emphasize the convent s inclusivist rinzai zen practice in tandem with the nearby engakuji temple the rationale for this inclusivism is the continuing acceptance of the doctrine of skillful means h ben as expressed in the lotus sutra a notion repudiated or radically reinterpreted by most of the kamakura reformers in support of this contention the authors include a complete translation of the mirror for women by kakusan s contemporary muj ichien

this anthology reflects a range of japanese religions in their complex sometimes conflicting diversity in the tradition of the princeton readings in religions series the collection presents documents legends and miracle tales hagiographies ritual prayers and ceremonies sermons reform treatises doctrinal tracts historical and ethnographic writings most of which have been translated for the first time here that serve to illuminate the mosaic of japanese religions in practice george tanabe provides a lucid introduction to the patterned confusion of japan's religious practices he has ordered the anthology s forty five readings under the categories of ethical practices ritual practices and institutional practices moving beyond the traditional classifications of chronology religious traditions shinto confucianism buddhism etc and sects and illuminating the actual orientation of people who engage in religious practices within the anthology s three broad categories subdivisions address the topics of social values clerical and lay precepts gods spirits rituals of realization faith court and emperor sectarian founders wizards and heroes orthopraxis and orthodoxy and special places dating from the eighth through the twentieth centuries the documents are revealed to be open to various and evolving interpretations their meanings dependent not only on how they are placed in context but also on how individual researchers read them each text is preceded by an introductory explanation of the text s essence written by its translator instructors and students will find these explications useful starting points for their encounters with the varied worlds of practice within which the texts interact with readers and changing contexts religions of japan in practice is a compendium of relationships between great minds and ordinary people abstruse theories and mundane acts natural and supernatural powers altruism and self interest disappointment and hope quiescence and war it is an

indispensable sourcebook for scholars students and general readers seeking engagement with the fertile ordered disorder of religious practice in japan

the essays in martyrdom self sacrifice and self immolation address the delicate subject of those elective deaths which can be categorized as religiously sanctioned suicides broadly condemned as cowardice across the world s moral codes suicide under certain circumstances such as martyrdom self sacrifice or self immolation historically carries a dynamic importance in religious legends some tragic and others uplifting

senshi was born in 964 and died in 1035 in the heian period of japanese history 794 1185 most of the poems discussed here are what may loosely be called buddhist poems since they deal with buddhist scriptures practices and ideas for this reason most of them have been treated as examples of a category or subgenre of waka called

shakkyoka buddhist poems yet many shakkyoka are more like other poems in the waka canon than they are unlike them in the case of senshi s buddhist poems their language links them to the traditions of secular verse moreover the poems use the essentially secular public literary language of waka to address and express serious and relatively private religious concerns and aspirations in reading senshi s poems it is as important to think about their relationship to the traditions and conventions of waka and to other waka texts as it is to think about their relationship to buddhist thoughts practices and texts the buddhist poetry of the great kamo priestess creates a context for the reading of senshi s poems by presenting what is known and what has been thought about her and them as such it is a vital source for any reader of senshi and other literature of the heian period

this series of interpretations of selected classics examines premodern japanese literature from the perspective of conflictual ideologies professor marra s analysis of such works as the ise monogatari the hojoki and tsurezuregusa highlights the existence of discontent in the authors of the so called high tradition and explains the means these authors used to express their social dissatisfaction in literary texts his aim is to recover the validity of the historicist
