for nearly ten years john griswold has been publishing his essays in inside higher ed mcsweeney s internet tendency brevity ninth letter and adjunct advocate many under the pen name oronte churm churm s topics have ranged widely exploring themes such as the writing life and the utility of creative writing classes race issues in a university town and the beautiful protective crocodiles that lie patiently waiting in the minds of fathers though griswold recently entered the tenure stream much of his experience at a big ten university has been as an adjunct lecturer that tenuous and uncertain position so many now occupy in higher education in pirates you don t know griswold writes poignantly and hilariously about the contingent nature of this life tying it to his birth in the last american enclave in saigon during the vietnam war his upbringing in a coal town in southern illinois and his experience as an army deep sea diver and frogman he investigates class in america through four generations of his family and portrays the continuing joys and challenges of fatherhood while making a living becoming literate and staying open to the world but griswold s central concerns apply to everyone what does it mean to be educated what does it mean to think feel create and be whole what is the point of this particular journey pirates you don t know is griswold s vital attempt at making sense of his life as a writer and now professor the answers for him are both comic and profound picture long john silver at the end of the movie his dory filled with stolen gold rowing and sinking rowing sinking and gloating

cover all the major contributions of a preeminent philosopher in a systematic and accessible manner robert nozick is one of the most creative and individual philosophical voices of the last 25 years his most famous book anarchy state and utopia 1974 presents the classic defense of the libertarian view that only a minimal state is just nozick has also made significant contributions in later publications to such areas as rational choice theory ethics epistemology and philosophy of mind outside philosophy the book will be of particular interest to professionals and students in political science law economics sociology and psychology

reeve s book is an excellent companion to plato s apology and a valuable discussion of many of the main issues that arise in the early dialogues reeve is an extremely careful reader of texts and his familiarity with the legal and cultural background of socrates trial allows him to correct many common misunderstandings of that event in

addition he integrates his reading of the apology with a sophisticated discussion of socrates philosophy the writing is clear and succinct and the research is informed by a thorough acquaintance with the secondary literature reeve s book will be accessible to any serious undergraduate but it is also a work that will have to be taken into account by every scholar doing advanced research on socrates richard kraut northwestern university

theories of liberal multiculturalism seek to reconcile cultural rights with universal liberal principles some focus on individual autonomy others emphasize communal identity andrew robinson argues that liberal multiculturalism can be justified without privileging either by appealing to the deeper value of meaningful life he shows how autonomy and community are actually interdependent he concludes by illustrating with reference to national and ethnic minorities indigenous peoples and traditional communities the policy principles that can be derived from this position an innovative account of the theory and practice of liberal multiculturalism multiculturalism and the foundations of meaningful life will interest students scholars activists and policy makers working in areas of political theory multiculturalism indigenous peoples and ethnic and religious minorities

this exploration of virtue ethics offers an original theory in moral philosophy identifying a moral reflection as a virtue that has not yet been considered properly by philosophers the author argues that taking our moral lives seriously must involve some reflection on our moral past

socrates stands as one of the most influential figures in the history of philosophy a thinker whose ideas and methods continue to shape intellectual inquiry born in athens around 469 bce he never wrote a single philosophical text yet his impact endures through the works of his students particularly plato his approach to philosophy was rooted in dialogue questioning and an unwavering commitment to seeking truth unlike the sophists of his time who often prioritized rhetorical skill and persuasion socrates believed that wisdom was not about appearing knowledgeable but about recognizing one s own ignorance his method of relentless questioning now

known as the socratic method remains a cornerstone of critical thinking and philosophical discourse socrates lived during a period of great political and social upheaval in athens the city had emerged from the peloponnesian war weakened and uncertain about its future in this context socrates became both an admired and controversial figure his insistence on questioning authority and challenging conventional beliefs made him a target for those who saw his influence as destabilizing he did not align himself with any particular political faction but instead sought to examine the moral and ethical foundations of society his discussions often exposed the contradictions in the reasoning of politicians poets and fellow citizens leading many to view him as a disruptive force his trial in 399 bce remains one of the most significant moments in philosophical history accused of corrupting the youth and impiety socrates defended himself in a manner that was both defiant and deeply philosophical in the apology plato s account of the trial socrates argues that he was fulfilling a divine mission by encouraging people to think critically and examine their lives his famous declaration that the unexamined life is not worth living captures the essence of his philosophy a belief that true fulfillment comes not from wealth or status but from the pursuit of wisdom and self understanding rather than escaping his fate socrates accepted the death sentence choosing to die rather than compromise his principles

when first published in 1958 the inward morning was ahead of its time boldly original it blended east and west nature and culture the personal and the universal the critical establishment confounded largely ignored the work readers however embraced bugbee s lyrical philosophy of wilderness throughout the 1960s and 1970s this philosophical daybook enjoyed the status of an underground classic with this paperback reissue the inward morning will be brought to the attention of a new generation henry bugbee is increasingly recognized as the only truly american existentialist and an original philosopher of wilderness who is an inspiration to a growing number of contemporary philosophers
