expanding at a rapid pace this expansion ranges from the medical and surgical advances in treating parkinson s disease to the flood of genetic abnormalities that have now been found to cause various movement disorders although many patients are seen by the movement disorders specialist in neurology clinics around the country most of these patients receive their followup care from a primary care physician or general neurologist who must be versed in the character istics and treatment plans of this diverse group of disorders the major goal of parkinson s disease and movement disorders diagnosis and treatment guidelines for the practicing physician is to distill this immense amount of information and to educate the practitioner about the many facets of the movement disorders field we believe that this book fills a large void since most texts on movement disorders are more detailed and geared toward the specialist we have asked the chapter authors to emphasize the clinical characteristics of each disorder discuss the differential diagnosis and the diagnostic testing and then outline the various treatment options as if they were teaching during a preceptorship in their clinic

this introductory textbook explores how the brain and spinal cord regulate movement it is designed for senior undergraduate and early stage graduate or clinical students in movement sciences physiology neuroscience biomedical engineering physical therapy occupational therapy rehabilitation sciences and speech sciences the book begins by presenting the fundamentals of cellular neurophysiology in a conceptual and accessible manner it then explores key principles of sensory processing using the somatosensory system as both a model system and a fundamental component of movement control the motor system is discussed in detail starting with the periphery focusing on the motor unit and progressing to motor areas in the cerebral cortex cerebellum and basal ganglia the roles of these regions are examined within the framework of three broad categories of movement reflexes rhythmic behaviours and voluntary movements the book also discusses various neurological disorders affecting movement and outlines current therapeutic approaches
