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this volume aims to cover the whole spectrum of cyberspace and related new technologies to explore the ways in which new technologies are reshaping cultural forms and practices at the turn of the century

an introduction to cybercultures provides an accessible guide to the major forms practices and meanings of this rapidly growing field from the evolution of hardware and software to the emergence of cyberpunk film and fiction david bell introduces readers to the key aspects of cyberculture including email the internet digital imaging technologies computer games and digital special effects each chapter contains hot links to key articles in its companion volume the cybercultures reader suggestions for further reading and details of relevant websites individual chapters examine cybercultures an introduction storying cyberspace cultural studies in cyberspace community and cyberculture identities in cyberculture bodies in cyberculture cybersubcultures researching cybercultures

from the stone age to the cyber age women and men have experienced the world differently out of a cosmos of goddesses and she devils earth mothers and madonnas witches and queens saints and whores a vast body of women s folklore has come into bloom international in scope and drawing on more than 130 expert contributors this encyclopedia reviews the myths traditions and beliefs central to women s daily lives more than 260 alphabetically arranged entries cover the lore of women across time space and life students of history religion and spirituality healing and traditional medicine literature and world cultures will value this encyclopedia as an indispensable guide to women s folklore in addition there are entries on women s folklore and folklife in 15 regions of the world such as the caribbean central asia the middle east and western europe entries provide cross references and cite works for further reading and the encyclopedia closes with a selected bibliography of print and electronic resources students learning about history world cultures religion and spirituality healing and traditional medicine and literature will welcome this companion to the daily life of women across time and continents

taking stock of the exciting work that is being done and positing what cyberculture s future might look like this book brings together a diverse and multidisciplinary group of scholars from around the world to assess the state of the field

this collection of critical essays investigates an emergent and increasingly important field of cultural production in latin america cyberliterature and cyberculture in their varying manifestations including blogs and hypertext narratives collective novels and e mags digital art and short net films highly innovative in its conception this book provides the first sustained academic focus on this area of cultural production and investigates the ways in which cyberliterature and cyberculture in the broadest sense are providing new configurations of subjects narrative voices and even political agency for latin americans the volume is divided into two main sections the first comprises eight chapters on the broad area of cyberculture and identity formation preservation including the development of different types of cybercommunities in latin america while many of the chapters applaud the creative potential of these new virtual communities identities and cultural products to create networks across boundaries and offer new contestatory strategies they also consider whether such phenomena may risk reinforcing existing social inequalities or perpetuate conservatism the second section comprises six chapters and an afterword that deal with the nature of cyberliterature in all its many forms from the cyber cultural legacies of writers such as julio cortázar and jorge luis borges to traditional print literature from the region that reflects on the subject of new technology to weblogs and hypertext and hypermedia fiction proper

the body and discourse seem diametrically opposed but we interact with our bodies and represent ourselves and our relationships in bodily terms this volume integrates new studies by leading researchers in sociolinguistics sociology social psychology and cultural theory it explores the many interfaces of body and discourse organized under three main themes the body as an interactional resource ideological representations of the body and discursive constructions of the body in normal and pathological contexts

racing cyberculture explores new media art that challenges the race blind myth of cyberspace the particular cultural workers whose productions are addressed are the performance and installation artist guillermo gomez pena and roberto sifuentes the uk new media arts collective mongrel the conceptual artists and composer keith obadike and the multimedia artist prema murthy the author looks at how works by these artists bring forward questions of racial and cultural identity as they intersect with information technology

examination of the stranger will appeal to scholars across the social sciences with interests in social theory and the theoretical foundations of discourses relating to migration cosmopolitanism globalisation and multiculturalism

identity is a central organizing feature of our social world across the social sciences and humanities it is increasingly treated as something that is actively and publicly accomplished in discourse this book defines identity in its broadest sense in terms of how people display who they are to each other each chapter examines a different discursive environment in which people do identity work everyday conversation institutional settings narrative and stories commodified contexts spatial locations and virtual environments the authors describe and demonstrate a range of discourse and interaction analytic methods as they are put to use in the study of identity including performative analyses conversation analysis membership categorization analysis critical discourse analysis narrative analysis positioning theory discursive psychology and politeness theory the book aims to give readers a clear sense of the coherence or otherwise of these different approaches the practical steps taken in analysis and their situation within broader critical debates through the use of detailed and original identity case studies in a variety of spoken and written texts in order the book offers a practical and accessible insight into what the discursive accomplishment of identity actually looks like and how to go about analyzing it

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
