this collection opens with an inquiry into the assumptions and methods of the historical study of culture comparing the new cultural history with the old thirteen essays follow each defining a problem within a particular culture in the first section biography and autobiography three scholars explore historically changing types of self conception each reflecting larger cultural meanings essays included examine italian renaissance biographers and the autobiographies of benjamin franklin and mohandas gandhi a second group of contributors explore problems raised by the writing of history itself especially as it relates to a notion of culture here examples are drawn from the writings of thucydides jacob burckhardt and the art historians alois riegl and josef strzygowski in the third section politics nationalism and culture the essays explore relationships between cultural creativity and national identity with case studies focusing on the holy roman emperor maximilian i the place of castile within the national history of spain and the impact of world war i on work of thomas mann the final section cultural translation raises the complex questions of cultural influence and the transmission of traditions over time through studies of philo of alexandria s interpretation of the hebrew bible erasmus use of socrates jean bodin s conception of roman law and adaptations of the hebrew bible for american children

ever since the first contacts between europe and africa african people have been confined

historian philosopher critic playwright journalist and actor egon friedell was a key figure in the extraordinary flowering of viennese culture between the two world wars his masterpiece a cultural history of the modern age demonstrates the intellectual universality that friedell saw as guarantor of the continuity and regeneration of european civilization following a brilliant opening essay on cultural history and why it should be studied the first volume begins with an analysis of the transformation of the medieval mind as it evolved from the black death to the thirty years war the emphasis is on the spiritual and cultural vortex of civilization but friedell never forgets the european roots in pestilence death and superstition that animate a contrary drive toward reason refinement intellectual curiosity and scientific knowledge while these values reached their apogee during the renaissance friedell shows that each cultural victory is precarious and europe was always in danger of slipping back into barbarism friedell s historical vision embraces the whole of western culture and its development it is a consistent probing for the divine in the world s course and is therefore theology it is research into the basic forces of the human soul and is therefore psychology it is the most illuminating presentation of the forms of state and society and therefore is politics the most varied collection of all art creations and is therefore aesthetics thomas mann regarded friedell as one of the great stylists in the german language like the works of the great novelist a cultural history of the modern age offers a dramatic history of the last six centuries showing the driving forces of each age

the new introduction provides a fascinating biographical sketch of friedell and his cultural milieu and analyzes his place in intellectual history

in this deeply probing intellectually challenging work dr jaanvalsiner lays the groundwork for a dynamic new cultural historical approach to developmental psychology he begins by deconstructingtraditional developmental theory exposing the conceptual confusionand epistemological blind spots that he believes continue toundermine the scientific validity of its methodologies hedescribes the ways in which embedded cultural biases shapeinterventional goals and influence both the direction researchtakes and the ways in which research data are interpreted and hesuggests ways in which researchers and clinicians can become moreaware of and transcend those biases dr valsiner then develops a hierarchical systemic model that portrays development as an open ended dialectical process centralto valsiner s approach is the premise that since each child isunique as are his or her life conditions deviations in functionor the rate of development from a prescribed norm are just aslikely to be constructive adaptations to changing environmentalpressures as symptoms of psychological disorder drawing uponsources as varied as linguistic philosophy structuralanthropology thermodynamics and systems theory as well as thework of many of the leading figures in twentieth centurydevelopmental theory valsiner argues convincingly for an approachto developmental psychology mature enough to recognize the difference between healthy variability and dysfunction in later chapters the focus shifts from development in the abstractto the everyday challenges encountered by the developing child case histories illustrate the subtle interplay of cultural physiological and psychological factors in shaping childhoodbehavior called an intellectual tour de force by the bulletin of themenninger clinic culture and the development of children s actionis important reading for developmental psychologists childpsychologists and all child clinicians of course no science progresses in a linear fashion it movesinterdependently with the society in which it is embedded makinguse of the narrative forms in describing itself to its insiders andoutsiders the rhetoric of scientists about their science istherefore necessarily inconsistent sciences are both socialinstitutions within a society and social organizations that attemptto build universal knowledge it is a complicated task forpsychology to be both knowledge constructing and self reflexive atthe same time nevertheless it is the latter kind of reflexivitythat guides the actual construction of knowledge jaanvalsiner this book is a fascinating and important work that challengesmuch of contemporary developmental psychology the second editionhas changed in a number of respects and much new material has been added but at root valsiner grapples with the question how shallwe understand development he continues to struggle also with whathe describes rather vividly as the epistemological windmills ofpsychology his challenge is summed up succinctly in two linesfrom a poem by t s eliot where is the wisdom we have lost in knowledge where is the knowledge we have lost in information from the foreword by kevin connolly

the central asian republics of kazakhstan kyrgyzstan turkmenistan tajikistan and uzbekistan won their independence from the soviet union in 1991 now they are emerging from the shadow of dominance and are subjects of intense interest from the west the modern culture and customs of the various peoples in these geopolitical hotspots straddling the far reaches of europe into asia are revealed to a general audience for the first time this will be the must have volume for a broad authoritative overview of these traditional civilizations as they cope with globalization

if eugenics the science of eliminating kinds of undesirable human beings from the species record came to overdetermine the late 19th century in relation to disability the 20th century may be best characterized as managing the repercussions for variable human populations a cultural history of disability in the modern age provides an interdisciplinary overview of disability as an outpouring of professional political and representational efforts to fix correct eliminate preserve and even cultivate the value of crip bodies this book pursues analyses of disability s deployment as a wellspring for an alternative ethics of living in and alongside the body different while simultaneously considering the varied social and material contexts of devalued human differences from world war i to the present in short this volume demonstrates that in ozymandias like ways the western project of the human with its perpetuation of body mind hierarchies lies crumbling in the deserts of failed empires genocidal furies and the rejuvenating myths of new nation states in the 20th century an essential resource for researchers scholars and students of history literature culture philosophy rehabilitation technology and education a cultural history of disability in the modern age explores such themes and topics as atypical bodies mobility impairment chronic pain and illness blindness deafness speech learning difficulties and mental health while wrestling with their status as unreliable predictors of what constitutes undesirable humanity

this collection discusses and illustrates how educational research is affected by the economic institutional and physical contingencies of its time and in our time even increasingly is driven by them it is argued that the antidote to this is however not to aspire to thought itself but instead to do justice to its own rootedness in the material including textuality from an historical point of view such an innovative approach can itself revamp the material scholarly culture and the way it is represented the chapters address a variety of topics such as the cultural heritage of the school desk the significance of images for research into long term educational processes the way iconic signs function and how modes of enquiry relate to the materiality of education attention is also given to standards for reporting on educational research studies and how these limit the scope and communication and moreover shape researchers to the forms of citation practices as

culture and cultural politics under reza shah presents a collection of innovative research on the interaction of culture and politics accompanying the vigorous modernization programme of the first pahlavi ruler examining a broad spectrum of this multifaceted interaction it makes an important contribution to the cultural history of the 1920s and 1930s in iran when under the rule of reza shah pahlavi dramatic changes took place inside iranian society with special reference to the practical implementation of specific reform endeavours the various contributions critically analyze different facets of the relationship between cultural politics individual reformers and the everyday life of modernist iranians interpreting culture in its broadest sense this book brings together contributions from different disciplines such as literary history social history ethnomusicology art history and middle eastern politics in this way it combines for the first time the cultural history of iran s modernity with the politics of the reza shah period challenging a limited understanding of authoritarian rule under reza shah this book is a useful contribution to existing literature for students and scholars of middle eastern history iranian history and iranian culture

the book is excellent in setting out and explaining a fundamental critique of economics one moreover that has been missed by most other current critics of the field making this case is an achievement hopefully it will have a greater impact than its author probably expects journal of cultural economics economics evolved by perfecting the taking of culture out of its reductionist and virtual world but culture has recently been reintroduced both as a sphere of application for an otherwise unchanging methodology and as a weak form of acknowledging that the economic alone is inadequate as the basis even for explaining the economy this volume is an essential critical starting point for understanding the changing relationship between economics and culture and in offering a more satisfactory and stable union between the two ben fine university of london uk economics culture and social theory examines how culture has been neglected in economic theorising and considers how economics could benefit by incorporating ideas from social and cultural theory orthodox economics has prompted a long line of cultural criticism that goes back to the origins of economic theory and extends to recent debates surrounding postmodernism william a jackson discusses the cultural critique of economics identifies the main arguments and assesses their implications among the topics covered are relativism and realism idealism and materialism agency and structure hermeneutics semiotics and cultural evolution drawing from varied literatures notably social and cultural theory the book stresses the importance of culture for economic behaviour and looks at the prospects for a renewed and culturally informed economics the book will be invaluable to heterodox economists and to anyone interested in the links between culture and the economy it takes an interdisciplinary approach arguing against the isolation of economics and will therefore hold wide appeal for social scientists working in related fields as well as for economists specialising in cultural economics and economic methodology

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
