blum s distinctive form of theoretical inquiry pushes the reader to move beyond conventional ways of thinking about familiar urban issues in answering such fundamental questions as how does a city exist how do its inhabitants define their relationship to it who is entitled to speak for it what is its symbolic nature in what way does the city function as a focus of attempts to resolve social problems such as alienation participation and community in what ways do night and nighttime affect our relationship to it how is it possible to speak of a city as both exciting and alienating

a theoretically informed investigation that relates the philosophies of aesthetics and imagination to understanding design practice in the aesthetics of imagination in design mads folkmann investigates design in both material and immaterial terms design objects folkmann argues will always be dual phenomena material and immaterial sensual and conceptual actual and possible drawing on formal theories of aesthetics and the phenomenology of imagination he seeks to answer fundamental questions about what design is and how it works that are often ignored in academic research folkmann considers three conditions in design the possible the aesthetic and the imagination imagination is a central formative power behind the creation and the life of design objects aesthetics describes the sensual conceptual and contextual codes through which design objects communicate the concept of the possible the enabling of new uses conceptions and perceptions lies behind imagination and aesthetics the possible folkmann argues is contained as a structure of meaning within the objects of design which act as part of our interface with the world taking a largely phenomenological perspective that reflects both continental and american pragmatist approaches folkmann also makes use of discourses that range from practice focused accounts of design methodology to cultural studies throughout he offers concrete examples to illustrate theoretical

points folkmann s philosophically informed account shows design in all its manifestations from physical products to principles of organization to be an essential medium for the articulation and transformation of culture

this book explores the presence of slaves and slavery in roman literature and asks particularly what the free imagination made of the experience of living with slaves beings who both were and were not fellow humans as a shadow humanity slaves furnished the free with other selves and imaginative alibis as well as mediators between and substitutes for their peers as presences that witnessed their owners most unguarded moments they possessed a knowledge that was the object of both curiosity and anxiety the book discusses not only the ideological relations of roman literature to the institution of slavery but also the ways in which slavery provided a metaphor for a range of other relationships and experiences and in particular for literature itself it is arranged thematically and covers a broad chronological and generic field

the catholic contribution to english literary culture has been widely neglected or misunderstood this book sets out to rehabilitate a wide range of catholic imaginative writing while exposing the role of

anti catholicism as an imaginative stimulus to mainstream writers in tudor and stuart england it discusses canonical figures such as sidney spenser webster and middleton those whose presence in the canon has been more fitful and many who have escaped the attention of literary critics among the themes to emerge are the anti catholic imagery of revenge tragedy and the definitive contribution made by southwell and crashaw to the post reformation revival of religious verse in england alison shell offers a fascinating exploration of the rhetorical stratagems by which catholics sought to demonstrate simultaneous loyalties to the monarch and to their religion and of the stimulus given to the catholic literary imagination by the persecution and exile so many of these writers suffered

religion in late modernity runs against the grain of common suppositions of contemporary theology and philosophy of religion against the common supposition that basic religious terms have no real reference but are mere functions of human need the book presents a pragmatic theory of religious symbolism in terms of which the cognitive engagement of the ultimate is of a piece with the cognitive engagement of nature and persons throughout this discussion neville develops a late modern conception of god that is defensible in a global theological public against the common supposition that religion is on the retreat in late modernity except in fundamentalist forms the author argues that religion in our time is a stimulus to religiously oriented scholarship a civilizing force among world societies a foundation for obligation in politics a source for healthy social experimentation and the most important mover of soul against the common supposition that religious thinking or theology is confessional and inevitably biased in favor of the thinker s community neville argues for the public character of theology the need for history and phenomenology of religion in philosophy of religion and the possibility of objectivity through the contextualization of philosophy contrary to the fashionable claims of neo pragmatism this vigorous analysis and program for religious thinking is straightforwardly pro late modern and anti postmodern a rousing gallop along the high road around modernism
