this book greatest tamil book tirukkural oldest language sanskrit contains over thirty articles on tirukkural of tiruvalluvar the greatest poet of tamil speaking world and the oldest language sanskrit these articles appeared in my two blogs over the period of 13 years apart from tirukkural there are articles touching bharati the greatest tamil poet of modern age and bhartruhari author of nitia sataka sanskrit and prakrit have lot of interesting books such as nitisataka of bhartuhari and gatha sapta sati since this is the third book dealing with tamil and sanskrit matters inside india i have included the contents of my previous two books at the end if you look at the contents of all the three books you will get a full picture of the marvellous productions in these two languages outside india we see sanskrit inscriptions in turkey bogazkoi dated around 1400 bce and dasaratha letters in egypt and we have over 850 sanskrit inscriptions in south east asian countries

the book titled stories of tamil devadasis dance dramas in rig veda has two parts the first part deals with the tamil devadasis of india and sri lanka i came across a rare tamil book in the british library in london the authoress herself was born in a devadasi family and had published a book in tamil about 100 years ago when i featured the book on facebook one research scholar approached me to translate it into english i did a translation giving the gist of her writing my thanks are due to that woman ms anjukam she had collected the life stories of about 30 courtesans the second part of the book contains my research articles on the origin of dance and dramas we have ample evidence for dance performances in the oldest book the rig veda there are about 20 dialogue poems in the rig veda they are actually dance dramas enacted after the yagas and yajnas what we have got in those poems are the plots or themes of those dance dramas and the actors would have built full length dance dramas over those plots at that time there are interesting articles on bharata s natya shastra since it is a technical work that too in sanskrit not many

people know the contents there are very interesting details about the origin stage colour of the theatre seats and actors jewellery etc in the book

provides a text and detailed commentary on the bhagavad gita an important hindu scripture which is a dialogue between arjuna the man and krishna the god this book examines major hindu concepts and presents the background to the gita it also contains detailed notes to the gita chapters

the tamil brahmans were a traditional mainly rural high caste elite who have been transformed into a modern urban middle class community since the late nineteenth century many tamil brahmans today are in professional and managerial occupations such as engineering and information technology most of them live in chennai and other tamilnadu towns but others have migrated to the rest of india and overseas this book which is mainly based on the authors ethnographic research describes and analyses this transformation it is also a study of how and why the tamil brahmans privileged status within a hierarchical society has been perpetuated in the face of both a strong anti brahman movement in tamilnadu and a series of wider social cultural economic political and ideological changes that might have been expected to undermine their position completely the major topics discussed include brahman rural society urban migration and urban ways of life education and employment the position of women and religion and culture the tamil brahmans class position including the internal division into the upper and lower middle classes and the process of class reproduction are examined closely to analyze the congruence between tamil brahmanhood and middle classness which as comparison with other brahman and non brahman groups shows is highly unusual in contemporary india

the topics covered in this book include dravidas three tamil academies lemuria or kumari continent tolkapppiam and tribes of nilgris they were published in the last 11 years in my two blogs they are of enormous interest to tamils they have created big controversies in the olden days the debate over those topics are still on foreign writers projected dravidians as primitive and

uncultured community max muller said that the aryans came into india from outside in the same way bishop caldwell said that the dravidians came from mediterranean region mr kanakasabai pillai who wrote tamils 1800 years ago said that tamils came into india from mongolia some historians proposed that the three tamil sangam are a myth no two scholars agreed on these topics

the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries central to this movement was pandit iyothee thass 1845 1914 a pioneering intellectual who reinterpreted india s buddhist past to challenge brahminical dominance thass reasoned that it was because many indians followed buddhist cultural and material traditions in ancient times they were oppressed as untouchables and lower castes by self privileging caste groups such as brahmins thus thass challenged brahminism casteism in india by reconstructing and mobilizing a reading public about the casteless buddhist history of indians who were prone to caste oppression his writings petitions and archives reveal the castelessness of tamil buddhists and their commitment for a radical political transformation in modern india key aspects of the tamil buddhist movement include public mobilization for caste free societies self representation of oppressed communities economic redistribution through affirmative action and a feminist critique of caste and patriarchy through interdisciplinary methods from critical caste studies this monograph uncovers the intellectual history of tamil buddhism and its radical call for vernacular emancipation it highlights how indigenous tamil indian communities used buddhist foundations to resist caste and envision a modern casteless future

this book analyses the religious ideology of a tamil reformer and saint ramalinga swamigal of the 19th century and his posthumous reception in the tamil country and sheds light on the transformation of tamil religion that both his works and the understanding of him brought about the book traces the hagiographical and biographical process by which ramalinga swamigal is shifted from being considered an exemplary poet saint of the tamil Śaivite bhakti tradition to a dravidian nationalist social reformer taking as a starting point ramalinga s own writing the book presents him as inhabiting a border zone between early modernity and modernity between hinduism and christianity between colonialism and regional nationalism highlighting the influence of his teachings on politics particularly within dravidian cultural and political nationalism simultaneously the book considers the implication of such an hagiographical process for the transformation of tamil religion in the period between the 19th mid 20th centuries the author demonstrates that ramaling swamigal s ideology of compassion cīvakārunyam had not only a long genealogy in pre modern tamil Śaivism but also that it functioned as a potentially emancipatory ethics of salvation and caste critique not just for him but also for other tamil and dalit intellectuals of the 19th century this book is a path breaking study that also traces the common grounds between the religious visions of two of the most prominent subaltern figures of tamil modernity iyothee thass and ramalingar it argues that these transformations are one meaningful way for a religious tradition to cope with and come to terms with the implications of historicization and the demands of colonial modernity it is therefore a valuable contribution to the field of religion south asian history and literature and subaltern studies the open access version of this book available at taylorfrancis com books e 9781315794518 has been made available under a creative commons attribution non commercial no derivatives 4 0 license
