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this remarkable primate with the curious name is challenging established views on human evolution the bonobo least known of the great apes is a female centered egalitarian species that has been dubbed the make love not war primate by specialists in bonobo society females form alliances to intimidate males sexual behavior in virtually every partner combination replaces aggression and serves many social functions and unrelated groups mingle instead of fighting the species s most striking achievement is not tool use or warfare but sensitivity to others in the first book to combine and compare data from captivity and the field frans de waal a world renowned primatologist and frans lanting an internationally acclaimed wildlife photographer present the most up to date perspective available on the bonobo focusing on social organization de waal compares the bonobo with its better known relative the chimpanzee the bonobo s relatively nonviolent behavior and the tendency for females to dominate males confront the evolutionary models derived from observing the chimpanzee s male power politics cooperative hunting and intergroup warfare further the bonobo s frequent imaginative sexual contacts along with its low reproduction rate belie any notion that the sole natural purpose of sex is procreation humans share over 98 percent of their genetic material with the bonobo and the chimpanzee is it possible that the peaceable bonobo has retained traits of our common ancestor that we find hard to recognize in ourselves eight superb full color photo essays offer a rare view of the bonobo in its native habitat in the rain forests of zaire as well as in zoos

after you spot a dozen of your relatives among these candid portraits you ll see why the great apes are called our close cousins the portraits on the back cover show a frowning gorilla looking at a smiling one an inquiring chimpanzee a smiling orangutan gazing skyward and a fashion portrait of a wet bonobo

we have long attributed man s violent aggressive competitive nature to his animal ancestry but what if we are just as given to cooperation empathy and morality by virtue of our genes from a scientist and writer whom e o wilson has called the world authority on primate social behavior comes a lively look at the most provocative aspects of human nature power sex violence kindness and morality through our two closest cousins in the ape family for nearly twenty years frans de waal has worked with both the famously aggressive chimpanzee and the lesser known egalitarian erotic matriarchal bonobo two species whose dna is nearly identical to that of humans he brings these apes to life on every page revealing their personalities relationships and power struggles creating an engrossing narrative that explores what their behaviour can teach us about ourselves and each other

how do desires and fears motivate human sociability what effect do these motivators have on reproductive social and political behaviour and crucially how might we understand them separate from preconceived notions of design or higher morality taking these questions as a focus this book examines human evolution with the emphasis on sexual selection and the evolution of a number of human psychological processes exploring evolutionary sexual and maturational processes along with primate fossil and geological evidence vannelli argues that human nature can be conceptualised as species typical desires and fears derived from sexual selection during human evolution and that these are major motivators of behaviour presenting additional evidence from the anthropology of band societies along with material from group behaviour vannelli highlights the importance of pair bonding friendship alliance behaviour vengeance seeking and interpersonal politics in social behaviour providing a unique interdisciplinary framework for understanding human nature and the evolution of human sociability

Arboreal greater apes are larger, more intelligent, and show complex social and emotional behavior. Humans are classified as great apes and share about 98–99% of their DNA with chimpanzees and bonobos. Humans and other apes share a common ancestor that lived about 5–7 million years ago. Studying apes helps scientists understand human evolution, including behavior, intelligence, and physical adaptations. Humans did not evolve from modern apes, but both groups evolved separately from a shared ancestor.
