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lanterns in the cave takes one of philosophy s most enduring images the shadows on plato s cave wall and asks what light we

might cast upon it today in this illuminating work richard parr explores how our modern shadows are shaped not by firelight but by screens algorithms and the stories we tell ourselves blending classical thought with contemporary culture parr reimagines the allegory of the cave for a world of digital illusions and shifting truths are we ever really outside the cave or are we simply holding different lanterns in the dark what counts as reality when every perspective is a projection written with clarity wit and philosophical depth lanterns in the cave is a guide for readers seeking to navigate the interplay between appearance and reality in the twenty first century this is not just a return to plato but a step beyond him an invitation to rethink what it means to see to know and to be free

in this original wide ranging and endlessly thought provoking work of popular nonfiction a leading science writer uncovers the pervasive presence of shadows in our world for plato shadows were the symbol of our limitations for galileo they knocked the earth from the center of the cosmos they are a source of fear and a symbol of ignorance and they loom large in art and design mythology and folklore physics and metaphysics and architecture and urban planning from shadows puppets and the psychology of shadows to the role of shadows in astronomy and the influence of shadows on the architectural profiles of our cities roberto casati awakens our fascination in this tour de force of investigation and imagination

it is an excellent book highly intelligent interesting and original expressing high philosophy in a readable form without trivialising it is a very difficult task and mcaleer manages the task admirably plato is yet again intensely topical in the chaotic and confused world in which we are now living philip allott professor emeritus of international public law at cambridge university this book is a lucid and accessible companion to plato s republic throwing light upon the text s arguments and main themes placing them in the wider context of the text s structure in its illumination of the philosophical ideas underpinning the work it provides readers with an understanding and appreciation of the complexity and literary artistry of plato s republic mcaleer not only unpacks the key overarching questions of the text what is justice and is a just life happier than an unjust life but also highlights some fascinating overlooked passages which contribute to our understanding of plato s philosophical thought plato s republic an introduction offers a rigorous and thought provoking analysis of the text helping readers navigate one of the world s most influential works of philosophy and political theory with its approachable tone and clear presentation it constitutes a welcome contribution to the field and will be an indispensable resource for philosophy students and teachers as well as general readers new to or returning to the text

psychoanalytic encounters are filled with the unknowability of two unconscious minds meeting here one may forge a link that enables the process of meaning making or else it can become the space for destruction perversion evacuation regression and stasis the area that lies between the mind of the analyst and that of the analysand is thus the liminal area of psychoanalysis of growth change turbulence as well as that of impasse bastion and failure this latter could be what bion meant by minus links it seems that the primitive part of the mind is always looking for ways to evade psychic pain and emotional truth is always in peril analytic links are always fraught with danger minus links share with each other the quality of evading truth and therefore inhibiting emotional growth and the capacity to give meaning to experiences blind spots may be enabled by analytic allegiance to our particular schools our inability to forge a technique in the face of the protomental apparatus which can breed arrogance the complacencies of language gaps between our theoretical allegiance and our technique and finally all too often our unwillingness and inability to get in touch with our true experience would it help to chronicle our quotidian failures in these liminal moments the links between analyst and analysand slide away from the emotional truth rather than towards it nilofer kaul presents these moments and explores the complex reasons behind them in a stunning debut work that questions the heart of analytic practice

using the cave as a key to plato s political thought huard debunks conventional interpretations conservative and progressive and unfolds plato s notions about the structure of the world and his ideas about justice and human well being and challenges many of our conceptions of the cosmos and deeply held political beliefs

author ken dorter in a passage by passage analysis traces plato s depiction of how the most basic forms of human functioning and social justice contain the seed of their evolution into increasingly complex structures as well as the seed of their degeneration dorter also traces plato s tendency to begin an investigation with models based on rigid distinctions for the sake of clarity which are subsequently transformed into more fluid conceptions that no longer sacrifice complexity and subtlety for clarity it s the author s claim that virtually every positive doctrine put forward in the dialogue is problematized somewhere else in the dialogue this accounts for the apparent incoherence among various parts of the republic the dramatic changes of style and content after books 1 4 7 and 9 give it an appearance of being a pastiche of material written at different times as it is often

interpreted dorter locates an underlying structure that explains these changes it is widely recognized that the dialogue is organized symmetrically in the form of an arch with the beginning and end sharing related themes the second and penultimate sections sharing other related themes and so on until the forward series and the reverse series meet in the middle of the dialogue dorter s original claim is that the symmetrical segments of the arch reflect the levels of the divided line dorter contends that the overall organization of the republic can be seen to illustrate and imitate the philosophers ascent from the cave and their subsequent return to it with altered perspectives this erudite salient and expansive new look at plato s republic is essential for philosophy political theorists and anyone interested in plato scholarship

matthias smalbrugge compares modern images to plays without a script while they appear to refer to a deeper identity or reality it is ultimately the image itself that truly matters he argues that our modern society of images is the product of a destructive tendency in the christian notion of the image in general and augustine of hippo s in particular this insight enables him to decode our current scripts of image as we live in an increasingly visual culture we are constantly confronted with images that seem to exist without a deeper identity or reality but did this referential character really get lost over time smalbrugge first explores the roots of the modern image by analysing imagery what it represents and its moral state within the framework of platonic philosophy he then moves to the augustinian heritage in particular the soliloquies the confessions and the trinity where he finds valuable insights into images and memory he explores within the trinitarian framework the crossroads of a theology of grace and a theology based on neoplatonic views smalbrugge ultimately answers two questions what happened to the referential character of the image and can it be recovered

about the fifth century bc three civilizations independently and simultaneously began to philosophize about nothing china chapter 3 india chapters 4 and 5 and greece chapters 6 10 they had previously focused on what is the case light poured on nature architecture and society but then in a cross civilizational black out emerged disparate nay sayers who shifted attention to what is not the case behold the holes in a sponge are absences of sponge holes are what make the sponge useful for absorbing liquid the sponge can exist without the holes but the holes cannot exist without the sponge they are parasites that depend on their host yet the two get along well without holes there would not be so many sponges in your house your shadow is a more

complex parasite it is a hole you bore into the light your shadow depends on both you and the light you and light are rather mysterious your shadow partakes of both mysteries

lighting and shadows are used within a range of art forms to create aesthetic effects piotr sadowski s study of light and shadow in weimar cinema and contemporaneous visual arts is underpinned by the evolutionary semiotic theories of indexicality and iconicity these theories explain the unique communicative and emotive power of light and shadow when used in contemporary indexical media including the shadow theatre silhouette portraits camera obscura photography and film in particular sadowski highlights the aesthetic and emotional significance of shadows the cast shadow as an indexical sign maintains a physical connection with its near present referent such as a hidden person stimulating a viewer s imagination and provoking responses including anxiety or curiosity the cinematic shadow plays a stylistic role by enhancing image texture depth of field and tonal contrast of cinematic moments such enhancements are especially important in monochromatic films and sadowski interweaves the book with accounts of seminal weimar cinema moments sadowski s book is distinctive for combining historical materials and theoretical approaches to develop a deeper understanding of weimar cinema and other contemporary art forms the semiotics of light and shadows is an ideal resource for both scholars and students working in linguistics semiotics film media and visual arts
