georgia odyssey is a lively survey of the state s history from its beginnings as a european colony to its current standing as an international business mecca from the self imposed isolation of its jim crow era to its role as host of the centennial olympic games and beyond from its long reign as the linchpin state of the democratic solid south to its current dominance by the republican party this new edition incorporates current trends that have placed georgia among the country s most dynamic and attractive states fueled the growth of its hispanic and asian american populations and otherwise dramatically altered its demographic economic social and cultural appearance and persona the constantly shifting cultural landscape of contemporary georgia writes james c cobb presents a jumbled panorama of anachronism contradiction contrast and peculiarity a georgia native cobb delights in debunking familiar myths about his state as he brings its past to life and makes it relevant to today not all of that past is pleasant to recall cobb notes moreover not all of today s Georgians are as unequivocal as the tobacco farmer who informed a visiting journalist in 1938 that we Georgians are Georgian as hell that said a great many Georgians both natives and new arrivals care deeply about the state s identity and consider it integral to their own georgia odyssey is the ideal introduction to our past and a unique and often provocative look at the interaction of that past with our present and future

in the aftermath of world war ii georgia s veterans black white liberal reactionary pro union and anti union all found that service in the war enhanced their sense of male political and racial identity but often in contradictory ways in defining the peace jennifer e brooks shows how veterans competed in a protracted and sometimes violent struggle to determine the complex character of georgia s postwar future brooks finds that veterans shaped the key events of the era including the gubernatorial campaigns of both eugene talmadge and herman talmadge the defeat of entrenched political machines in augusta and savannah the terrorism perpetrated against black citizens the cio s drive to organize the textile south and the controversies that dominated the 1947 georgia general assembly progressive black and white veterans forged new grassroots networks to mobilize voters against racial and economic conservatives who opposed their vision of a democratic south most white veterans however opted to support candidates who favored a conservative program of modernization that aimed to alter the state s economic landscape while sustaining its anti union and racial traditions as brooks demonstrates world war ii veterans played a pivotal role in shaping the war s political impact on the south generating a politics of race anti unionism and modernization that stood as the war s most lasting political legacy

cobb surveys the remarkable story of southern identity and its persistence in the face of sweeping changes in the south s economy society and political structure dust jacket

this thought provoking study by historian monique laney focuses on the u s government assisted integration of german rocket specialists and their families into a small southern community soon after world war ii in 1950 wernher von braun and his team of rocket experts relocated to huntsville alabama a town that would celebrate the team despite their essential role in the recent nazi war effort for their contributions to the u s army missile program and later to nasa s space program based on oral histories provided by members of the african american and jewish communities and by the rocketeers families co workers friends and neighbors laney s book demonstrates how the histories of german nazism and jim crow in the american south intertwine in narratives about the past this is a critical reassessment of a singular time that links the cold war the space race and the civil rights era while addressing important issues of transnational science and technology and asking americans to consider their country s own history of racism when reflecting on the nazi past

although the civil war reconfigured dixie in the half century since the end of world war ii the american south has been

massively changed again it is still an improbable mix of tradition and transition but the stereotype of a region with one party politics one crop agriculture white supremacy cultural insularity grinding poverty somnolent cotton towns and languorous rural landscapes has largely passed into history possum trot and tobacco road have been suburbanized and how have walmarts as the regions s boosters insist the nations s numberOne economic problem has joined the great booming sunbelt for good or for ill a new sense has been visited upon nearly every southern place what elements caused such striking change to the face of dixie in this volume nine widely known specialists in the history and literature of the american south search for the origins of this sweeping regional transformation in the period of the second world war these original essays address a cluster of related problems of enduring fascination for all those who wish to understand the ever changing ever abiding south offering new answers to important questions they address the second world war as a major watershed in southern history did it drive old dixie down did it set in motion forces that ultimately shaped a newer south did it further americanize the south by eroding traditional patterns of thought and deed that once were fiercely defended by white southerners as our way of life was the postwar south less different less peculiar and distinctive

the transformation of the american south from authoritarian to democratic rule is the most important political development since world war ii it has re sorted voters into parties remapped presidential elections and helped polarize congress most important it is the final step in america s democratization paths out of dixie illuminates this sea change by analyzing the democratization experiences of georgia mississippi and south carolina robert mickey argues that southern states from the 1890s until the early 1970s constituted pockets of authoritarian rule trapped within and sustained by a federal democracy these enclaves devoted to cheap agricultural labor and white supremacy were established by conservative democrats to protect their careers and clients from the abolition of the whites only democratic primary in 1944 until the national party reforms of the early 1970s enclaves were battered and destroyed by a series of democratization pressures from inside and outside their borders drawing on archival research mickey traces how deep south rulers dissimilar in their internal conflict and political institutions varied in their responses to these challenges ultimately enclaves differed in their degree of violence incorporation of african americans and reconciliation of democrats with the national party these diverse paths generated political and economic legacies that continue to reverberate today focusing on enclave rulers their governance challenges and the monumental achievements of their adversaries paths out of dixie shows how the struggles of the recent past have reshaped the south and in so doing america s political development

to dusk talking and laughing in a space free of white supervision and largely beyond white knowledge as millions of black people left the violence of the american south for the promise of a better life in the north and west these networks of resistance and joy sustained early arrivals and newcomers alike and laid the groundwork for organizing for better jobs better pay and equal rights as her narrative moves from georgia to philadelphia florida to chicago texas to oakland kelley treats black workers not just as laborers or members of a class or activists but as people whose daily experiences mattered to themselves to their communities and to a nation that denied that basic fact through affecting portraits of her great grandfather a sharecropper named solicitor and her grandmother brunell who worked for more than a decade as a domestic maid kelley captures in intimate detail how generation after generation of labor was required to improve and at times maintain her family s status yet her family like so many others was always animated by a vision of a better future the church yards factory floors railcars and postal sorting facilities where black people worked were sites of possibility and as kelley suggests amazon package processing centers supermarkets and nursing homes can be the same today with the resurgence of labor activism in our own time black folk presents a stirring history of our possible future

this georgia rising is a study of georgia's political changes in the decade of the second world war and in the postwar years of the 1940s georgia's political establishment underwent challenges in the 1940s in everything from georgians defending the state's university system from attacks by governor eugene talmadge to challenges by georgia's larger

cities and towns to the state's county unit system to the early postwar stirrings of the modern civil rights movement an array of progressive forces including georgia's veterans of the second world war college and university students newspaper editors and reporters in the state's larger circulating newspapers and smaller town newspapers fought for change in some of the state's political institutions culminating in the 1942 election of governor ellis arnall and in 1945 the changes to the state constitution this georgia rising is a detailed study of the gubernatorial races of the 1940s as they are interwoven with the larger political and social changes of wartime and then postwar georgia this book draws not only from georgia's larger circulation newspapers but also focuses on its smaller circulation newspapers and especially its african american newspapers including the atlanta daily world and the savannah tribune this georgia rising offers a detailed and rich narrative of a decade of far reaching change in twentieth century georgia publisher description

in 1811 architect benjamin henry latrobe spurred american builders into action when he called for them to reject the corrupt age of dioclesian or the still more absurd and debased taste of louis the xiv and to emulate instead the ancient temples of greece in response people in the antebellum trans appalachian region embraced the clean lines intricate details and stately symmetry of the grecian style on newly built public buildings private homes and religious structures references to classical greek architecture became the preferred ornamentation several antebellum cities and towns adopted the moniker of athens styling themselves as centers of culture education and sophistication as the trend grew american citizens understood the name as a link between the grecian style and the founding principles of democracy signaling a change of taste in service to the larger american cultural ideal in athens on the frontier patrick lee lucas examines the material culture of grecian style buildings in antebellum america to help recover nineteenth century regional identities as communities worked to define their built landscape and develop a shared western identity lucas's study invites readers to question many of the assumptions americans have made about divisions and cultural formation in antebellum society

as turbulent social and economic changes swept the south in the first half of the twentieth century education became the flashpoint ann short chirhart's study is the first to analyze such modernizing events in georgia she shows how these changes affected the creation of the state's public school system and cast its teachers in a crucial role as mediators between transformation and tradition depicting georgia's steps toward modernity through teachers professional and cultural work and the educational reforms they advocated chirhart presents a unique perspective on the convergence

of voices across the state calling for reform or continuity secularism or theology equality or enforced norms consumption or self reliance although most teachers black and white shared backgrounds rooted in localism and evangelical protestantism attitudes about race and gender kept them apart african american teachers individually and collectively redefined traditional beliefs to buttress ideals of racial uplift and to press for equal access to public services white women adapted similar beliefs in different ways to enhance their efforts to train greater numbers of white students for professional and wage labor torches of light is based on such sources as government archives manuscript collections and interviews with teachers as chirhart examines the ideas over which Georgians clashed she also shows how those ideas were embodied in New Deal and U.S. Department of Agriculture programs the political activities of the Black Georgia Teachers and Educators Association and the Georgia Legislature's 1949 Minimum Foundation Act through two world wars and the Great Depression teachers sought to reconcile clashing beliefs not only to renegotiate class race and gender roles but also to enhance their own professionalism and authority

in 1996 patterson hood recruited friends and fellow musicians in athens georgia to form his dream band a group with no set lineup that specialized in rowdy rock and roll the drive by truckers as they named themselves grew into one of the best and most consequential rock bands of the twenty first century a great live act whose songs deliver the truth and nuance rarely bestowed on southerners so often reduced to stereotypes where the devil don t stay tells the band s unlikely story not chronologically but geographically seeing the truckers albums as roadmaps through a landscape that is half real half imagined their fellow southerner stephen deusner travels to the places the band s members have lived in and written about tracking the band from muscle shoals alabama to richmond virginia to the author s hometown in mcnaury county tennessee deusner explores the truckers complex relationship to the south and the issues of class race history and religion that run through their music drawing on new interviews with past and present band members including jason isbell where the devil don t stay is more than the story of a great american band it s a reflection on the power of music and how it can frame and shape a larger culture

in the 1960s mississippi was the heart of white southern resistance to the civil rights movement to many it was a backward looking society of racist authoritarianism and violence that was sorely out of step with modern liberal america white mississippians however had a different vision of themselves and their country one so persuasive that by 1980 they had become important players in ronald reagan s newly ascendant republican party in this ambitious reassessment of racial politics in the deep south joseph crespino reveals how mississippi leaders strategically accommodated themselves to the demands of civil rights activists and the federal government seeking to end jim crow and in so doing contributed to a vibrant conservative countermovement crespino explains how white mississippians linked their fight to preserve jim crow with other conservative causes with evangelical christians worried about liberalism infecting their churches with cold warriors concerned about the communist threat and with parents worried about where and with whom their children were schooled crespino reveals important divisions among mississippi whites offering the most nuanced portrayal yet of how conservative southerners bridged the gap between the politics of jim crow and that of the modern republican south this book lends new insight into how white mississippians gave rise to a broad popular reaction against modern liberalism that recast american politics in the closing decades of the twentieth century
