Kenneth Lee Pike Bibliography

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biographic memoirs volume 84 contains the biographies of deceased members of the national academy of sciences and bibliographies of their published works each biographical essay was written by a member of the academy familiar with the professional career of the deceased for historical and bibliographical purposes these volumes are worth returning to time and again

american national biography is the first new comprehensive biographical dicionary focused on american history to be published in seventy years produced under the auspices of the american council of learned societies the anb contains over 17 500 profiles on historical figures written by an expert in the field and completed with a bibliography the scope of the work is enormous from the earlest recorded european explorations to the very recent past

the book also features cross references throughout a bibliography accompanying each entry an elaborate appendix listing biographies according to particular categories of interest and a comprehensive index book jacket

this biography examines the life of a most unusual twentieth century evangelical kenneth l ken pike 1912 2000 who served with the wycliffe bible translators and the summer institute of linguistics pike began his missionary career as a bible translator but he went on to become a world class linguist who made his mark on the science of linguistics and the study of indigenous languages around the world known among linguists and anthropologists for his theoretical contributions this volume seeks to bring pike to a wider audience by illuminating his life as a key evangelical figure one who often broke with conventional evangelical constraints to pursue the life of the mind as a christian intellectual and scholar here is a story of how one evangelical christian man served the global church the scientific community and the world s indigenous peoples with his entire heart soul and mind

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the range of topics addressed in this collection can be seen in the titles of the four sections into which the chapters are grouped humanistic approaches to linguistic analysis the nature and uses of language and linguistic theory poetry linguistic analysis and language teaching and language learning and teaching among the contributors are a l becker paul friedrich paul hopper william labov kenneth pike harold rosen emanuel schegloff muriel saville troike h g widdowson and deborah tannen

this volume contains functional approaches to the description of language and culture and language and cultural change the approaches taken by the authors range from cognitive approaches including stratificational grammar to more socially oriented ones including systemic functional linguistics the volume is organized into two sections the first section functional approaches to the structure of language theory and practice starts with contributions developing a stratificational model these are followed by contributions focusing on some related functional model of language and by articles describing some particular set of language phenomena in the second section functional approaches to the history of language and linguistics general studies of language change are addressed first a second group of contributions examines language change lexicon and culture and the last cluster of contributions treats the history of linguistics and culture

thoroughly revised and updated with some 500 new entries including the addition of pertinent internet sites this is the only bibliographic guide to information sources for linguistics coverage spans from 1957 the publication date of chomsky s seminal work to the present with emphasis on english language resources demiller s detailed citations describe and evaluate each work often offering comparisons to similar titles its broad coverage and in depth reviews make this work essential to the research and study of general or theoretical linguistics the book is also indispensable in the related areas of anthropological linguistics applied linguistics mathematical and computation linguistics psycholinguistics semiotics and sociolinguistics which are all treated in separate chapters as well as the study of language and languages from a linguistic perspective a must for any library supporting the study of linguistics or its related fields this is a valuable reference and research tool it i

ludwig wittgenstein s works encompass a huge number of published philosophical manuscripts notebooks lectures remarks and responses as well as his unpublished private diaries the diaries were written mainly in coded script to interpolate his writings on the philosophy of language with autobiographic passages but were previously unknown to the public and impossible to decode without learning the coding system this book deciphers the cryptography of the diary entries to examine what wittgenstein s personal idiom reveals about his public and private identities employing the semiotic doctrine of charles s peirce dinda l gorlée argues that the style of writing reflects the variety of wittgenstein s emotional moods which were profoundly affected by his medical symptoms bringing peirce s reasoning of abduction together with induction and deduction the book investigates how the semiosis of the emotional energetic and logical interpretations of signs and objects reveal wittgenstein s psychological states in the coded diaries

this third volume like its predecessors adds to the growing body of literature concerned with the history of biblical interpretation with eighteen

essays on nineteen biblical interpreters volume 3 expands the scope of scholars both traditional and modern covered in this now multivolume series each chapter provides a biographical sketch of its respective scholar s an overview of their major contributions to the field explanations of their theoretical and methodological approaches to interpretation and evaluations and applications of their methods by focusing on the contexts in which these scholars lived and worked these essays show what defining features qualify these scholars as pillars in the history of biblical interpretation while identifying a scholar as a pillar is somewhat subjective this volume defines a pillar as one who has made a distinctive contribution by using and exemplifying a clear method that has pushed the discipline forward at least within a given context and time period this volume is ideal for any class on the history of biblical interpretation and for those who want a greater understanding of how the field of biblical studies has developed and how certain interpreters have played a formative role in that development

volume 2 treats in great detail and at times quite innovatively the individual stages of development of the study of language as an autonomous discipline from the growing awareness in 17th and 18th century europe of genetic relationships among a host of languages to the establishment of comparative historical indo european linguistics in the 19th century from the generation of the schlegels bopp rask and grimm to the neogrammarians and the application of the comparative method to non indo european languages from all over the globe typological linguistic interests first synthesized by humboldt as well as the development of various other non historical endeavours in the 19th and the first half of the 20th century such as language and psychology semantics phonetics and dialectology receive ample attention

kenneth pike s influence spread far and wide during the last half of the twentieth century the contributors to this volume are just a few of the thousands of scholars whose work was influenced by pike s teaching and writing these essays will help younger scholars grasp something of his intellectual influence through his contribution to linguistics anthropology and many other disciplines long before the concept of endangered languages came into vogue in the 1990s pike was instilling in his students the importance of recording preserving and working to keep alive the thousands of unwritten languages spoken throughout the world pike s work with sil international took him to many parts of the world as a consultant and lecturer he worked with speakers of hundreds of indigenous languages as well as with sil field linguists studying those languages at the same time he interacted with scholars at international conferences and lectured at universities in many countries essays in this volume include papers by authors from at least ten countries and six disciplines readers of this volume will find a rich introduction to the life and philosophy of dr pike they will see how he considered all aspects of life language culture worldview religion and ways of thinking and learning to

be a coherent whole they will also find the authors own comments as to how pike influenced and contributed to their lives and work

offers a unique language based critique of new testament theology and reconceptualizes it using categories of modern linguistics

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
