in early china and ancient greece self cultivation was considered crucial for leading a flourishing fulfilled life in this cross cultural study david machek presents and interprets six influential greek and chinese self cultivation theories advocated by mengzi zhuangzi and xunzi as well as plato aristotle and the stoics in order to put forward the overarching narrative that self cultivation amounts to strengthening the best part of the human self the heart in the chinese context and the mind in the greek context advancing new readings of classic texts machek shows that greek approaches to self cultivation privilege intellectual pursuits while chinese approaches give more weight to non intellectual activities such as learning manual crafts and performing rituals he also demonstrates how both ancient traditions understand the self as a heterogeneous community of organic entities each needing different provisions to flourish which aligns the ancient greek view closer to the early chinese view as such this book reinforces the underlying structural and conceptual similarities between the two traditions and makes an important contribution to diversifying philosophical conversations

since its inception in 1994 scriptural reasoning has been practiced by academics and religious laypeople on an international scale scriptural reasoning is an activity or practice where jews christians and muslims read and study together short passages from their traditionally sacred texts in this book jacob I goodson describes this activity by giving a tour through modern philosophy and showing how certain arguments ideas and theories from modern philosophers help make sense of this inter religious practice according to goodson one of the most interesting aspects of the practice of scriptural reasoning concerns how its driven by a tension between pragmatism and semiotics what he calls purposefulness pragmatism vs playfulness semiotics throughout the book can inter religious practices only be playful in terms of an academic leisure activity or do inter religious practices need to strive toward a greater end or even a higher purpose such as peace making among the abrahamic faiths or inter religious friendships in each individual chapter goodson explores this tension within the practice of scriptural reasoning utilizing immanuel kant s deontology goodson concludes by demonstrating how the practice of scriptural reasoning might work if only two rules are in place while participating in it

an intriguing portrait of roger scruton and his philosophy roger scruton was one of the outstanding british philosophers of the post war years why then was he at best ignored and at worst reviled part of the reason was that he was an unapologetic conservative in the tradition of edmund burke that conservative instinct was sharpened during the paris riots of 1968 from that point on scruton set himself the task of stridently opposing what he termed the culture of repudiation in so doing he targeted liberals in the tradition of russell and mill existentialists like sartre and post modernists in the fashion of foucault here is a brilliant description of scruton s life and work and a careful analysis of his central ideas scruton defended an hegelian and burkean view of human nature one founded on allegiance to the state as the guarantor of tangible freedom he thus opposed any and all variations of the social contract theory liberal or existential individualism or philosophical theories of the authentic self in isolation from its kind his conservative notion of the nation state was used to reflect upon and criticise the european union the united nations and the idea that the middle east can be reformed along western democratic lines scruton argues mark dooley was the one british intellectual who courageously rowed against the tide of liberal conviction and arrived at political conclusions the truth of which are becoming more and more obvious this book argues conclusively that roger scruton was a prophet for our times

in plato s socrates on socrates socratic self disclosure and the public practice of philosophy anne marie schultz analyzes the philosophical and political implications of plato s presentation of socrates self disclosive speech in four dialogues theaetetus symposium apology and phaedo schultz argues that these moments of socratic self disclosure show that plato s presentation of socrates the narrator is much more pervasive than the secondary literature typically acknowledges despite the pervasive appearance of a socrates who describes his own experience throughout the dialogues socratic autobiographical self disclosure has received surprisingly little scholarly attention plato s use of narrative particularly his trope of socrates the narrator is often subsumed into discussions of the dramatic nature of the dialogues more generally rather than studied in its own right schultz shows how these carefully crafted narrative remarks add to the richness and profundity of the platonic texts on multiple levels to illustrate how these embedded socratic narratives contribute to the portrait of socrates as a public philosopher in plato s dialogues the author also examines socratic self disclosive practices in the works of bell hooks kathy khang and ta neishi coates and even practices the art of socratic self disclosure herself
