in this groundbreaking new work dillard makes a powerful case for bringing contemporary christian theology into critical dialogue with martin heidegger s contributions to philosophy of the event following his initial receptivity to theology in his early writings heidegger becomes increasingly agnostic and even atheistic in the 1930s until the sudden resurgence of religious discourse in contributions dillard shows that there are good reasons for heidegger s striking reversal key philosophical concepts from contributions enable heidegger to overcome earlier theological conundrums left unresolved in his earlier engagements with themes in st paul and luther while the need to make a fateful decision regarding the last god prevents the central philosophical task of contributions from collapsing into empty tautology or relapsing into objectionable metaphysics nevertheless heidegger leaves us in the predicament of having no clear idea of how we are to make the crucial decision about divinity after considering several unsuccessful proposals for escaping the dilemma dillard develops a christological solution based on heidegger s engagement with the poetry of georg trakl the resulting theological perspective is defended from some possible criticisms and situated within the broader context of contemporary postmetaphysical heideggerian theology

a defense of poetry argues that literature can be defined pragmatist and historicist arguments notwithstanding and that in its definition its unique value can be discovered in qualified opposition to the most sophisticated formalist definitions involving redundancy or economy of expression the author identifies literature ontologically as a sign of the preconceptual as the ostensive moment that discloses neither the purpose nor the structure of existence but existence itself revealed in its nonhuman register

in philosophical enactment and bodily cultivation in early daoism thomas michael illuminates the formative early history of the daodejing and the social political religious and philosophical trends that indelibly marked it this book centers on the matrix of the daodejing that harbors a penetrating phenomenology of the dao together with a rigorous system of bodily cultivation it traces the historical journey of the text from its earliest oral circulations to its later transcriptions seen in a growing collection of ancient chinese excavated manuscripts it examines the ways in which huang lao thinkers from the han dynasty transformed the original phenomenology of the daodejing into a metaphysics that reconfigured its original matrix and it explores the success of the wei jin daoist ge hong in bringing the matrix back into its original alignment this book is an important contribution to cross cultural studies bringing contemporary chinese scholarship on daoism into direct conversation with western scholarship on daoism the book also concludes with a discussion of martin heidegger s recognition of the position and value of the daodejing for the future of comparative philosophy

rhetorical realism responds to the surging interest in nonhumans across the humanities by exploring how realist commitments have historically accompanied understandings of rhetoric from antiquity to the present for a discipline that often defines itself according to human speech and

writing the nonhuman turn poses a number of challenges and opportunities for rhetoric to date many of the responses to the nonhuman turn in rhetoric have sought to address rhetoric s compatibility with new conceptions of materiality in rhetorical realism scot barnett extends this work by transforming it into a new historiographic methodology attuned to the presence and occlusion of things in rhetorical history through investigations of rhetoric s place in aristotelian metaphysics the language invention movement of the seventeenth century and postmodern conceptions of rhetoric as an epistemic art barnett s study expands the scope of rhetorical inquiry by showing how realist ideas have worked to frame rhetoric s scope and meanings during key moments in its history ultimately barnett argues that all versions of rhetoric depend upon some realist assumptions about the world rather than conceive of the nonhuman as a dramatic turning point in rhetorical theory rhetorical realism encourages rhetorical theorists to turn another eye toward what rhetoricians have always done defining and configuring rhetoric within a broader ontology of things

this book studies wallace stevens and pre socratic philosophy showing how concepts that animate stevens poetry parallel concepts and techniques found in the poetic works of parmenides empedocles and xenophanes and in the fragments of heraclitus tompsett traces the transition of pre socratic ideas into poetry and philosophy of the post kantian period assessing the impact that the mythologies associated with pre socratism have had on structures of metaphysical thought that are still found in poetry and philosophy today this transition is treated as becoming increasingly important as poetic and philosophic forms have progressively taken on the existential burden of our post theological age tompsett argues that stevens poetry attempts to play its audience into an ontological ground in an effort to show that his reduction of metaphysics is not dry philosophical imposition but is enacted by our encounter with the poems themselves through an analysis of the language and form of stevens poems tompsett uncovers the mythology his poetry shares with certain pre socratics and with greek tragedy this shows how such mythic rhythms are apparent within the work of friedrich nietzsche martin heidegger and hans georg gadamer and how these rhythms release a poetic understanding of the violence of a reduction of metaphysics

heidegger and ethics is a contentious conjunction of terms martin heidegger himself rejected the notion of ethics while his endorsement of

nazism is widely seen as unethical this major new study examines the complex and controversial issues involved in bringing them together by working backwards through his work from his 1964 claim that philosophy has been completed to being and time his first major work joanna hodge questions heidegger s denial that his enquires were concerned with ethics she discovers a form of ethics in heidegger s thinking which elucidates his important distinction between metaphysics and philosophy against many contemporary views she proposes therefore that ethics can be retrieved and questions the relation between ethics and metaphysics that heidegger had made so pervasive

we usually think about language and pain as opposites the one being about expression and connection the other destructive beyond words so to speak and isolating language pangs challenges these familiar conceptions and offers a radical reconsideration of the relationship between pain and language in terms of an essential interconnectedness ilit ferber s premise is that we cannot probe the experience of pain without taking account its inherent relation to language and vice versa that our understanding of the nature of language essentially depends on how we take account of its correspondence with pain language pangs brings together discussions of philosophical as well as literary texts an intersection that is especially productive in considering the phenomenology of pain and its bearing on language ferber explores a phenomenology of pain and its relation to language before providing a unique close reading of johann gottfried herder s treatise on the origin of language the first modern philosophical text to consider language and pain establishing the cry of pain as the origin of language herder also raises important claims regarding the relationship between human and animal questions of sympathy and the role of hearing in the expression of pain beyond herder the book grapples with the work of other profound thinkers including martin heidegger stanley cavell an and finally sophocles from them weaving new insights on the experience of pain expression sympathy and hearing

in the triadic structure of the mind francesco belfiore begins from the basic ontological conception of the structure and functioning of the mind or spirit as an evolving conscious triad composed of intellect sensitiveness and power each exerting a selfish or moral activity based on this concept belfiore has developed a coherent philosophical system through which he offers fresh solutions in the fields of ontology knowledge language aesthetic ethics politics and law the second edition of the book includes a more extensive treatment of the topics addressed in the first edition the introduction of new concepts and the inclusion of additional thinkers whose views have been discussed and reinterpreted

in the first book to examine the overlooked relationship between musical improvisation and philosophical hermeneutics sam mcauliffe asks what exactly is improvisation and how does it relate to our being in the world improvisation in music and philosophical hermeneutics answers these questions by investigating the underlying structure of improvisation mcauliffe argues that improvising is best understood as attending and responding to the situation in which one find itself and as such is essential to how we engage with the world working within the hermeneutic philosophical tradition drawing primarily on the work of martin heidegger hans georg gadamer and jeff malpas this book provides a rich and detailed account of the ways in which we are all already experienced improvisers given the dominance of music in discussions of improvisation part i of this book uses improvised musical performance as a case study to uncover the ontological structure of improvisation a structure that mcauliffe demonstrates is identical to the structure of hermeneutic engagement exploring this relationship between improvisation and hermeneutics part ii offers a new reading of gadamer s philosophical hermeneutics examining the way in which gadamer s accounts of truth and understanding language and ethics each possess an essentially improvisational character working between philosophy and music theory improvisation in music and philosophical hermeneutics unveils the hermeneutic character of musical performance the musicality of hermeneutic engagement and the universality of improvisation

although philosophers have examined and commented on music for centuries martin heidegger one of the greatest philosophers of the 20th century had frustratingly little to say about music directly at least this volume the first to tackle heidegger and music features contributions from philosophers musicians educators and musicologists from many countries throughout the world aims to utilize heidegger s philosophy to shed light on the place of music in different contexts and fields of practice heidegger s thought is applied to a wide range of musical spheres including improvisation classical music electronic music african music ancient chinese music jazz rock n roll composition and musical performance the volume also features a wide range of philosophical insights on the essence of music music s place in society and the promise

of music s ability to open up new ways of understanding the world with the onset of the technological and digital musical age heidegger and music breaks new philosophical ground by showcasing creative vignettes that not only push heidegger s concepts in new directions but also get us to question the meaning of music in various contexts

the heart of history for heidegger is not a sequence of occurrences but the eruption of significance at critical junctures that bring us into our own by making all being including our being into an urgent issue in emergency being emerges from the emergency of being the esoteric contributions to philosophy often considered martin heidegger s second main work after being and time is crucial to any interpretation of his thought here heidegger proposes that being takes place as appropriation richard polt s independent minded account of the contributions interprets appropriation as an event of emergency that demands to be thought in a future subjunctive mode polt explores the roots of appropriation in heidegger s earlier philosophy heidegger s search for a way of thinking suited to appropriation and the implications of appropriation for time space human existence and beings as a whole in his concluding chapter polt reflects critically on the difficulties of the radically antirationalist and antimodern thought of the contributions polt s original reading neither reduces this challenging text to familiar concepts nor refutes it but engages it in a confrontation an encounter that respects a way of thinking by struggling with it he describes this most private work of heidegger s philosophy as a dissonant symphony that imperfectly weaves together its moments into a vast fugue under the leitmotif of appropriation this fugue is seeded with possibilities that are waiting for us its listeners to develop them some are dead ends viruses that can lead only to a monolithic monotonous misunderstanding of history others are embryonic insights that promise to deepen our thought and perhaps our lives if we find the right way to make them our own

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
