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often treated like night itself both visible and invisible feared and romanticized latina os make up the largest minority group in the us in her newest work maría deguzmán explores representations of night in art and literature from the caribbean colombia central and south america and the us calling into question night s effect on the formation of identity for latina os in and outside of the us she takes as her subject novels short stories poetry essays non fiction photo fictions photography and film and examines these texts through the lenses of nationhood sexuality human rights exoticism among others

lugubrious nightsfollows the protagonist tediato on his nightly visits to the temple where his beloved is interred his ultimate intention is to disinter her body and kill himself in her presence tediato is a religious skeptic whose grief is cosmic and he sees no reason not to join his beloved in death torn as he is between the emptiness of his soul and the emptiness of the world hispanist russell p sebold offers the first english translation of the eighteenth century spanish lyrical poem in prose by josé de cadalso 1741 1782 inspired by his grief over the death of the actress maría ignacia ibáñez cadalso composed lugubrious nights in 1771 sebold considers it to be the first fully romantic work of continental european literature written three years before the publication of goethe swerther

harper aims to provide readers with a deeper more accurate understanding of falla s creative process by drawing from a complete array of rare authentic sources including falla s own personal library valuable sketch material and the more than 20 000 pieces of correspondence maintained in granada spain by the manuel de falla archive the book is arranged in three sections the first part of the book organized according to falla s geographical stays attempts to clarify certain aspects of falla s life that have to date been ambiguous or unknown the second section engages various prominent aspects of falla s character such as his relationship with his european contemporaries in this second section significant collaborations with prestigious falla specialists louis jambou michael christofordis and chris collins have greatly enhanced the dimension of the topics addressed the book s final section attempts to introduce readers to the most recent information available it is generously illustrated with manuscript examples and is organized according to the stylistic classifications of the manuel de falla archive s musical director which greatly assist in clarifying the development of falla s creative process a chronologically arranged photo section rounds out this offering that will be of great significance to music students and teachers as well as those with an interest in spanish culture

noches lúgubres publicada originalmente por entregas en el correo de madrid en 1771 es sin duda la obra más famosa de cadalso y seguramente el primer texto romántico europeo pues con él se inaugura el tama romántico del suicidio así como el primer poema en prosa de la literatura española nos versa la historia de tediato que dialoga con lorenzo el sepulturero del cementerio donde yace enterrada su amada durante tres noches seguidas tediato pretende desenterrar su cadáver para llevarlo a

cas y suicidarse junto a ella se añade a esta edición su autobiografía texto breve prácticamente inédito hasta 1962 donde cadalso trata en términos poco favorables entre otras cosas sobre personajes poderosos de su época como el conde aranda por lo que su difusión en vida hubiera sido de lo más arriesgado para el autor la historia personal el activismo patriótico y el atrevimiento crítico convirtieron a josé cadalso literato y militar a caballo entre el neoclasicismo y el romanticismo en una figura imprescindible de nuestra literatura

spanish vampire fiction since 1900 blood relations as that subtitle suggests makes the case for considering spanish vampire fiction an index of the complex relationship between intercultural phenomena and the specifics of a time place and author supernatural beings that drink blood are found in folklore worldwide spain included and writers ranging from the most canonical to the most marginal have written vampire stories spanish ones included too when they do they choose between various strategies of characterization or blend different ones together how much will they draw on conventions of the transnational corpus are their vampires to be local or foreign alluring or repulsive pitiable or pure evil for instance decisions like these determine the messages texts carry and when made by spanish authors may reveal aspects of their culture with striking candidness perhaps because the fantasy premise seems to give the false sense of security that this is harmless escapism and since metaphorical meaning is implicit it is open to argument and if necessary denial part i gives a chronological text by text appreciation of all the texts included in this volume many of them little known even to hispanists and few if any to non spanish gothic scholars it also provides a plot summary and brief background on the author of each these entries are free standing and designed to be consulted for reference or read together to give a sense of the evolution of the paradigm since 1900 part ii considers the corpus comparatively first with regard to its relationship to folklore and religion and then contagion and transmission spanish vampire fiction since 1900 blood relations will be of interest to anglophone gothic scholars who want to develop their knowledge of the spanish dimension of the mode and to hispanists who want to look at some canonical texts and authors from a new perspective but also gain an awareness of some interesting and decidedly non canonical material

taking up the invitation extended by tentative attempts over the past three decades to construct a functioning definition of the genre jonathan bradbury traces the development of the vernacular miscellany in sixteenth and seventeenth century spain and spanish america in the first full length study of this commercially successful and intellectually significant genre bradbury underlines the service performed by the miscellanists as disseminators of knowledge and information to a popular readership his comprehensive analysis of the miscelánea corrects long standing misconceptions starting from its poorly understood terminology and erects divisions between it and other related genres his work illuminates the relationship between the golden age spanish miscellany and those of the classical world and humanist milieu and illustrates

how the vernacular tradition moved away from these forebears bradbury examines in particular the later inclusion of explicitly fictional components such as poetic compositions and short prose fiction alongside the vulgarisation of erudite or inaccessible prose material which was the primary function of the earlier spanish miscellanies he tackles the flexibility of the miscelánea as a genre by assessing the conceptual thematic and formal aspects of such works and exploring the interaction of these features as a result a genre model emerges through which golden age works with fragmentary and non continuous contents can better be interpreted and classified

early modern european thought held that men and women were essentially the same during the seventeenth century medical and legal arguments began to turn against this one sex model with hermaphroditism seen as a medieval superstition this book traces this change in iberia in comparison to the earlier shift in thought in northern europe

iberian books ii iii presents an indispensable foundational listing of everything known to have been published in spain portugal and the new world or of items printed in spanish or portuguese elsewhere during the first half of the seventeenth century drawing on library catalogues specialist bibliographies and studies as well as auction catalogue records iberian books lists 45 000 items and the locations of some 215 000 copies surviving in 1 800 collections worldwide these volumes offer a powerful research tool which will appeal to researchers librarians and to the book selling and collecting communities they will prove invaluable to anyone with a research interest in the literature history and culture of the iberian peninsula in the early modern age this set supplements iberian books which logs the iberian print production up to 1601 los dos volúmenes de iberian books ii iii ofrecen un registro pionero de todos los impresos publicados en españa portugal y el nuevo mundo o en español o portugués en otros lugares entre 1601 y 1650 a partir del trabajo realizado en bibliotecas la revisión de bibliografías especializadas y de catálogos de casas de subastas iberian books recoge 45 000 impresos conservados en 215 000 ejemplares preservados en 1 800 colecciones de todo el mundo estos volúmenes ofrecen una herramienta de investigación de gran utilidad para investigadores bibliotecarios libreros y coleccionistas los dos volúmenes resultarán de enorme valor a todo aquel investigador interesado en la literatura

la historia y la cultura de la península ibérica de la edad moderna

in a unique analysis of cuban literature inside and outside the country's borders eduardo gonzález looks closely at the work of three of the most important contemporary cuban authors to write in the post 1959 diaspora guillermo cabrera infante 1929 2005 who left cuba for good in 1965 and established himself in london antonio benítez rojo 1931 2005 who settled in the united states and leonardo padura fuentes b 1955 who still lives and writes in cuba through the positive experiences of exile and wandering that appear in their work these three writers exhibit what gonzález calls romantic authorship a deep connection to the romantic spirit of irony and complex sublimity crafted in literature by lord byron thomas de quincey and samuel taylor coleridge in gonzález s view a writer becomes a belated romantic by dint of exile adopted creatively with comic or tragic irony gonzález weaves into his analysis related cinematic elements of myth folktale and the grotesque that appear in the work of filmmakers such as alfred hitchcock and pedro almodóvar placing the three cuban writers in conversation with artists and thinkers from british and american literature anthropology philosophy psychoanalysis and cinema gonzález ultimately provides a space in which cuba and its literature inside and outside its borders are deprovincialized

a burgeoning new branch of hispanic literature latino canadian writing is now becoming part of the canadian and quebec literary traditions latinocanadá a critical anthology examines the work of hispanic writers who have settled in canada over the past thirty years and includes newly translated selections of their work

in their contributions the authors reflect upon levý s thinking on translation as a communication process and on popovič s insistence on the importance of re creating a text both at the surface and deep levels examples are drawn from literary translation technical translation from audio visual translation and from interpreting and the authors point out that translators in all domains inevitably come up against linguistic textual and other constraints which if they are to be resolved successfully call upon a translator s and interpreter s strategies and creativity the authors argue that this is the essence of professional decision making in translation according to levý translation is a decision making process and that translation teachers should help students develop an understanding of translation strategies and of the vital role that creativity plays throughout the translation interpreting process
